Monday, January 1, 2018 SSI v. Medicare

Last month Social Security recipients got their notice of benefits for 2018. It says there will be a 2% increase in Social Security benfits. However, Medicare Part B premiums, which are taken off the top, will increase by more than 2%, essentially negating the SSI increase for many people.

Fortunately, there is a hold-harmless clause in the law relating to increases in Medicare premiums ... which means that the Medicare increase can be no more than the difference between the 2018 and 2017 Social Security benefits. My Medicare increase was low enough that I saw a net increase of seven dollars in the combined benefits. My wife, on the other hand - for the second year in a row - saw a net decrease in her benefit of one dollar due to rounding, barely meeting the hold-harmless provision.

Between the two of us, our combined increase in monthly SSI benefits minus Medicare premiums amounts to a whopping six dollars! Claudette's Medicare premium went up by \$20, an increase of 13% for 2018. Mine went up by \$27, a 20% increase over 2017.

What's got to be hard for many Social Security beneficiaries is that their checks are not keeping up with the cost of living. We've seen basic increases in rent, natural gas, gasoline, electricity, television service, telephone, internet service, food and taxes. And that doesn't take into account a 25% increase in Medicare Supplement and other insurance premiums. I figure our real inflation rate since January 2017 has been

something like 12% overall, hardly compensated by the government's piddly 2% increase in the basic benefit.

It seems to me that something is wrong about the way the government calculates the CPI (Consumer Price Index). So far this year, the GDP (Gross Domestic Product) is up a little over 3%, on track for 4% in 2018. That's an incredible change in economic growth. But, we won't be seeing the benefits of that growth until the new tax structure kicks in next year.

Meanwhile, a significant number of older folks are finding work as Greeters at Wal Mart as a way to supplement their income, thus offsetting the inability of the Social Security Administration to keep up with the real CPI.

Thursday, January 4, 2018

Who'da Thunk It?

Wul, pilgrim, here we are in the middle of the first week of January 2018! Who'da thunk it? What can we look forward to (hope for) this year? Let's see ...

First, chew on these tidbits from *Kim Strassel* in Monday's *Wall Street Journal*:

Let 2018 be the year of civil-service reform - a rootand-branch overhaul of the government itself. Call it *Operation Drain the Swamp*.

When Candidate Trump first referred to "the swamp," he was talking about the bog of Beltway lobbyists and "establishment" politicians. But *President Trump*'s first year in office has revealed that the real swamp is the unchecked power of those who actually run Washington: the two million members of the federal bureaucracy.

It's a federal workforce whose pay and benefits are completely out of whack with the private sector. A 2011 *American Enterprise Institute* study found federal employees receive wages 14% higher than what similar workers in the private sector earn. Factor in benefits and the compensation premium leaps to 61%. Nice, huh?

Civil-service reform's bipartisan appeal means it has a shot in the Senate. The *Chuck Schumer*s and *Elizabeth Warren*s will fight for their federal union buddies. But will [they be able to] defend the *CFPB*, the majority of whose employees take home six-figure

salaries, when the median personal income in the U.S. is about \$31,000?

Washington is now home to a bureaucratic elite, fantastically paid and protected, divorced from economic reality, and self-invested in thwarting conservative policy efforts. Let's drain the swamp, or at least make it smaller.

Second, Social Security (our subject line Monday) and its monitary limitations caused me to go look for more information on the subject. It turns out that there has been serious discussion about eliminating the limit on FICA earnings above \$127,200 and removing the limitation on FICA contributions above \$7,886.40. The current levels are not realistic. The Dems will scream because it hurts middle-income workers and therefore hurts the party politically ... but they'll go for it because it soaks the rich! Republicans will go for it because it makes sense for the government to apply best management and accounting practices and principles for a change. The problem is that Congress, ever mindful of the age-old political requirement to squander the Treasury, will be tempted to use the "windfall" to "buy down" the current \$20 Trillion deficit.

Third - I think this year could also be a turning point for morality. Not because a whole bunch of men have been accused of sexual improprieties, but rather because women have risen to the ages-old challenge that although men may have contributed their sisters' ribs, God is the One who gave them the strength to have children! It's not about subsurvience or dominance. It's about strength of character! In other words ... any woman who can bear childbirth will put up with just about anything to make things right for herself and family except for nasty old men misbehaving! This year women are going to tire of the incessant droning from the MSM about

Monday, January 8, 2018

The Biggest Threat

It wasn't that long ago that our government began seriously looking at the consequenses of an attack on America's electrical infrastructure. Late in 2016 a desktop computer at one of the utilities in Vermont was hacked. **USA Today** put it this way, "Dec 30, 2016 - Malware linked to a Russian hacking group was found Friday on a **Burlington Electric Department** computer not connected to the grid."

September 6, 2017 **Andy Greenburg** at **WIRED.com** wrote, "Security firm **Symantec** is warning that a series of recent hacker attacks not only compromised energy companies in the US and Europe but also resulted in the intruders gaining hands-on access to power grid operations - enough control that they could have induced blackouts on American soil at will. Symantec on Wednesday revealed a new campaign of attacks by a group it is calling **Dragonfly** 2.0, which it says targeted dozens of energy companies in the spring and summer of this year. In more than 20 cases, Symantec says the hackers successfully gained access to the target companies' networks. And at a handful of US power firms and at least one company in Turkey - none of which Symantec will name - their forensic analysis found that the hackers obtained what they call operational access ..."

One of the things I discovered as a business owner in the '70s was how long it took to get things done when the government was involved. Licensing, inspections, you name it - time is money in small business, so you can imagine the amount of cash the government "money-suckers" extracted from my operation with their incessant foot-dragging. Mind you, this was the '70s and the government was just getting started on oppressive regulations, what with the **Jimmy Carter**

Recession, Gas shortages and the EPA just getting off the ground.

In the '80s I became one of the managers at a technical development operation, the *University Instrument Shop*, at the **University of Arizona**, charged with helping Principal Investigators do their research. I had qualified for the job by virtue of equivalency to a Masters/PHD in Electrical Engineering and a PHD/Masters in Business Management.

One of the first things the boss wanted was a computer system that could interact with the (DEC10) University Data Center via (300 baud) PaxLine. We had two Altairs - one a rack-mount, the other a desk-mount, predecessors to the Apple 1 and the IBM-PC. My job was to obtain an operating system (CPM), create printer drivers and a system of labor time and inventory control. What a challenge! There we were, right on the cusp of technical innovation using non-main-frame computers! Using computers was supposed to reduce the amount of time it took to do work and to reduce the amount of paperwork involved. Yeah, well ... Programming computers to be in charge of paperwork is like putting vampires in charge of the blood bank!

We created something else ... computer crashes ... usually caused by thunderstorm-related power failures. Which created the question: How often do you back up your data? So much for saving paper. Of course, it took more time to handle the paperwork than it had before computers came into the picture. However, the real problem we discovered is something few have considered until recently. If there is a major power failure that shuts down the electronic infrastructure longer than it can maintain itself independently, what happens to all that data and how do we do business?

I've seen chain stores shut down because of power failures. They don't know how to do business on paper! A few employees can add using a pencil and paper, but very few know how to make change! Then, there's the problem of fuel delivery when electric gas pumps don't work. Keeping perishables cool is an enormous problem. Lack of heating and cooling could pose a major threat to the health and safety of many people. And transportation systems across the country don't work very well without electricity for communications and controls.

I contend that the greatest threat to our country is **not** terrorism and certainly not Climate Change! Rather, I'm telling you there can be certain devastation of American commerce, infrastructure, public health and safety, and the country's banking system caused by a protracted nation-wide power failure. Such a major catastrophy could be precipitated by electro-magnetic pulses (EMPs) caused by nuclear weapons fired from some offshore country. It could be caused by the very real threat of Dragonfly's recent infrastructure hacking. The fact is - it could happen!

Have Emergency Services across America developed plans to handle large-scale outages for protracted periods of time? Are there Intergovernmental Agreements in place to make implementation of services provided under a broad area plan in place? Has Law Enforcement created a master plan to maintain order and keep people safe? Are the school systems and large public buildings in the loop? Is there a plan in place that coordinates Police and Fire Departments, Sheriff's Offices, State Police, the National Guard, City, County, State and Federal health and welfare systems, Hospitals and the Emergency Broadcast System with Local, County, State and National Emergency Management Agencies? And, exactly how do they plan to communicate?

Certainly there <u>are</u> plans and systems in place. I know this to be true because I served on the **Gila County (AZ) Local Emergency Planning Commission** (LEPC 1999-2004) charged with planning workable strategies for emergencies.

What I don't know is if there are wide-spread coordinated plans all across the country to handle something as devastating as a long nation-wide power failure. A bunch of really smart people needs to be working on this issue because *it could happen*!

Monday, January 11, 2018 What Is It About 77?

I was born in Red Bluff, California on January 11th, 1941 - 77 years ago today. My dad was a Cat-skinner (Caterpillar Tractor Driver) at nearby Shasta Dam, a job he also held at the Giant Boulder (Hoover) Dam between Arizona and Nevada in the '30s. My mom had been among the first teachers at the one-room Orme Ranch School near Mayer, Arizona. The brand of the ranch was (sideways) (>| Quarter-Circle-V-Bar. I think the two of them met when she decided to take swimming lessons from him at Northern Arizona Normal School in Flagstaff, which became Arizona State College. They both attended the College (now NAU.)

The fact is I don't think of it very often ... all the proper paperwork is done and I'm at peace with myself and my family. True ... My

heart skips a beat every few minutes. I don't remember not having the condition. I always thought it was because I was very athletic - football, track, swimming - and I never paid that much attention to it. And I still don't unless I'm in bed in the twilight zone, feeling the faint pulse in my fingertips. The doctor said my brain would not get enough Oxygen one night and I just wouldn't wake up. Be that as it may ... it won't be painful and I can thank God for that good fortune.

So, what's the deal about 77? Damned if I know! I look forward to kickin' around until I'm in my early hundreds, at least! More Golf and pumping iron are probably in my future. That, and humble thanks to the Great Architect of the Universe for a great life so far.

Monday, January 15, 2018 - MLK Day

What Next?

Back in Mid December, Claudette and I received our annual Notice of Benefits from the Social Security Administration. Us old geezers were informed that we would be getting a two percent COLA (cost of living increase) in our benefits. We were also informed how much our Medicare Part B premiums would be increasing. I told y'all about this new year's day.

Part B premiums are taken off the top of Social Security payments - off the top, mind you. My Medicare took all but seven dollars of my two percent "raise." Somehow, Claudette's Medicare premium takes not only her Social Security "raise", but also an extra buck ... for the second year in a row! I'm getting a seven dollar COLA after all is said and done. She is getting a net decrease of a dollar. But that's for the second year in a row.

The Congress, in its wisdom (when Medicare was created and payment of premiums from Social Security payments were authorized as part of the deal) created a "hold harmless" clause in the law that guaranteed that nobody receiving Social Security benefits would ever recieve a net payment any year less than the previous year. Well, troops ... that's a bunch of bureaucratic balogna. Two years in a row, Claudette's net Social Security benefit has dropped by one dollar per month.

Well, I set about making things right to get her benefit back where it was supposed to be. President Trump has railed that government is too oppressive and clogged with un-needed rules and regulations - and he's demanded that for each new regulation there be two eliminated. So far, the record shows that, actually, twenty-one regulations have been removed for

each new one. Wow! Unforunately, it hasn't made much of a difference to those of us out here in the sticks!

I sent an email to Social Security based on their assurances that they could help. What I got back a coupla weeks later was a note that they were too busy to handle the problem by email, so I should call the 800 number. I did that ... and after fifteen minutes of gobledegook, I finally got the affirmative word from the sexy voice of the artificial intelligence: "Your estimated wait time is one hour and fifteen minutes."

Not one to wait as directed, I took up the cause with my US Senator's office. John McCain is one of my heros. Had I not chosen to drop out of college in 1959, I would have finished the Marine Corps Platoon Leaders Course, gone to Pensacola Florida to learn to fly jets, and probably would have been shot down over Viet Nam and become a Hanoi Hilton prison-mate of Senator McCain. So, I figured an email/contact with McCain's office could bear fruit. It took a coupla weeks for my request for help to work its way through the system, but it did. Finally. I got a 'phone call last week and we agreed to do business/casework by email.

The first email asked me to fill out a form and send it in with my electronic signature. That I did, and it was followed up with a request for an explanation of the problem. (That was Claudette's reduction in Social Security benefit two years in a row,) Redundant because the original request for assistance included that information! I have her Power of Attorney (and she has mine) so I emailed my Power off to Arizona's McCain Offices. What I got back was a statement to the effect that Social Security doesn't recognize Powers of Attorney. Just great! Over a piddly twelve dollars a year? Pheh!

So, I had Claudette sign a blank piece of paper, created a digital signature using my scanner and photo editor, filled out a form for her and attached her signature to it - just like I had done for my own required Privacy Consent form. This bureaucratic exercise began last Monday. When it will end depends entirely on what kind of rigamarole and red tape can be amended to this nonsense! We're talking twenty-four dollars, here - about what the Indians were paid in junk jewely for Long Island!

Paperwork does little more than clog things up, slow them down and increase the cost of government. At this point I have little hope for a quick (if any) solution because, to my knowledge, we haven't even tapped the Social Security Administration or Medicare! Just at Arizona's minimum wage, I'm betting we've already cost the taxpayers at least \$5.00. What a wonderous way to cut expenses and red tape!

Thursday, January 18, 2018 Can Dems Win AZ 2018?

Arizona is going to be a hotbed of political chicanery this year. The southwest state has always been a place where elections are fraught with ... you name it: trickery, deception, deceit, duplicity, dishonesty, subterfuge, fraud, skullduggery and other evil synonyms. The Valentine State is also a place were strange things have happened because of politics.

The main street in **Show Low** today is called the *Deuce of Clubs* (the lowest card in a standard card deck). Show Low was named by settler **Corydon E. Cooley** the winner of his neighbor **Marion Clark**'s land when they played Seven-up to determine who would move away to keep the peace. The two played the game and as the last hand was coming to an end, Clark said "*You show low, you win.*" Cooley turned over the deuce of clubs. These days, whenever there is a runoff for mayor of Show Low, instead of a runoff election the issue is settled by the two opponents drawing from a deck of cards until one draws the deuce of clubs. That person becomes the mayor for the next term.

Then there were the politicians indicted in February of 1991 on charges of bribery, money laundering and filing false election statements. The **AZScam** scandal felled three Republican and two Democrat Representatives, and two Democrat Senators. Representative **Sue Laybe**, accused of taking more than \$10,000 in cash, said, "This is a political indictment hatched for political reasons." That wasn't all of it though ... also indicted were **George Stragalas III**, one-time executive director of the **Arizona Democratic Party**; **Shiree Foster**, a staff assistant at the **Arizona Chamber of Commerce**; **Ernie Hoffman** and **Rich Scheffel**, independent lobbyists; **David Horwitz**, a lobbyist for the **American**

Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees; and David Manley, chairman of the Maricopa County Democratic Party.

During that time, it was common knowledge that Arizona Legislators were carrying paper bags full of cash around with them. Many, whose homes were elsewhere in the state, rather than rent, would stay with friends or relatives in the Phoenix metro area during the week and go home on the weekends. The per diem food, lodging and mileage paid them by the state was laundered into cash which was easy to carry in small paper bags. A little of that cash would go to supplement the food budget of the people with which they stayed. Arizona State Legislators received a \$15,000 salary plus \$35 a day per diem. If they lived out of Maricopa county they received \$60 per diem per day for regular and special sessions and \$10 a day after that. The total received in per diem for food, lodging and mileage by the end of a Legislative Session was always a tidy sum. Before 1981 Legislators receive a \$6,000 salary. Their pay was raised to \$24,000 by voter approval in 1998. The custom of carrying bagged cash pretty much stopped after the AZScam debacle.

Evan Mecham was elected Arizona's governor in November 1986 in a fractured, three-way race. On taking office, one of his first acts was to rescind the state's Martin Luther King Jr. holiday, a move that inflamed racial tensions and prompted public protests. Within six months, a recall drive was under way to give Meacham the boot. In January 1988, a grand jury indicted him and his brother on charges stemming from an investigation into campaign-finance violations and fraud. The Arizona Legislature, however, made the recall effort moot by impeaching him.

Governor J. Fife Symington III was forced to resign two years after a federal jury convicted him on bank- and wire-

fraud charges. During his first term, which began in 1991 he was investigated and cleared of any involvement with the failed **Southwest Savings & Loan** scandal, and he went on to win re-election in 1994. However, on September 4, 1997, he was indicted on 21 federal counts ranging from fraud to extortion to perjury. His conviction was overturned on appeal in 1999, and President **Bill Clinton** pardoned him in 2001.

Rick Renzi, a Republican member of the US House of Representatives, from Arizona's 1st Congressional District, was convicted on Federal criminal charges of fraud, racketeering and public corruption for his involvement in a questionable land-swap deal. Renzi was accused of embezzling insurance premiums to fund his political campaigns and using his power as a lawmaker to force changes in a proposed federal land swap to benefit a business associate. He was sentenced to three years in prison in June of 2013. The sentence was upheld by the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals. His legal team filed with the U S Supreme Court. But, the SCOTUS declined Monday a week ago to hear Renzi's appeal that sought to question the process of how he was prosecuted. He served a three year sentence and was released from prison in January of 2017.

More recently, according to the **New Times:** Sheriff **Joe Arpaio**, had been involved in more than two dozen controversies involving everything from bad jail conditions to abuse of power, improper clearance of cases, failure to investigate rape cases, feuds with judges, misuse of funds, racial profiling, and even staging a failed assassination attempt. In July, United States District Judge **Susan R. Bolton** found the 85-year-old Arpaio guilty of criminal contempt of court, a misdemeanor punishable by six months in jail. Arpaio was convicted of violating a court order to stop racially profiling Latinos, but President **Donald Trump** pardoned him before the scheduled sentencing. Arpaio, who

billed himself as "The Toughest Sheriff in America", served as Maricopa County's top Law Enforcement Officer for the 24 years between 1993 and 2016, when he was voted out of office.

U.S. Representative **Martha McSally** (R), former Air Force combat pilot, said Friday she will run against Arpaio, who threw his hat in the ring last week for the US Senate seat being abandoned by **Jeff Flake** (R). Contenders also include Representative **Kyrsten Sinema**, a centrist Democrat, and **Kelli Ward**, a conservative Republican and former Arizona state senator. Polls have McSally favored over second choice Arpaio. One thing's for sure: Odds are 3:1 (75/25) that Flake's Senate seat will go to a woman.

So, here are how the numbers worked out as of October 1st: There are 3,665,316 registered voters in Arizona, comprised of 1,289,893 Independents & "Others", 1,268,748 Republicans and 1,106,675 Democrats. Historically, voter turnout in Arizona for mid-term elections has run around 30% over the last two decades. What has changed nation-wide, as well as in Arizona, is the number of Independent voters, which has grown to exceed the registration in either of the other two parties.

Democrat organizers from all over the country are gearing up to change Arizona from Red to Blue. They will do whatever it takes to put Democrat Kyrsten Sinema in Flake's Senate seat. While national Democrat (**DNC**) fund-raising efforts have collected less than half that of the **RNC** this year, the Dems have been working on grass-roots organizing at the state and local levels, registering armies of new Democrats across the country. If you do the math you'll see that to catch the GOP in Arizona, Democrats will need to register 48,622 new voters - that's just to pull even with the Republicans - 54,966 to match

the number of Independents. And then they'll have to turn out more than 30%. That, my friends, is one heck of a tall order!

Monday, January 22, 2018

About the EAS System

A little over a week ago, a Hawaiian Emergency Systems employee, during shift change, accidentally hit the "Alert" button on the system computer and set off a thirty-eight minute island-wide panic. It took that long for the folks in charge to figure out that it was a false alarm and call it off. The degree of ignorance shown by that excercise is almost incomprehensible until you stop to contemplate who was involved. State-level employees and elected officials with no specific responsibility had to figure out what to do under extreme pressure. Well, they screwed up!

The fact is that the only outfit that can issue an alert of that nature is the US Military stationed in that area. They are the ones who detect missle launches and calculate tragectories to determine where a missile could land. They are the ones who would activate the Emergency Alert System, which would distribute the alert exactly the same way it happened the other day. The EAS is about as automatic as it gets ... but it's only as good as the information being diseminated.

Local EAS alert tests happen weekly all over America. You hear them on local radio and TV and most local cable channels. Regional test alerts are held more-or-less monthly. And there have been a number of National EAS tests in the past few years. One of the great success stories about the EAS is the Amber Alert. Do doubt about it. The delivery system works.

This from a September 2006 Homeland Security report: "From the air raid warning and plane spotting activities of the Office of Civil Defense in the 1940s, to the film strips and backyard shelters of the 1950s, to today's allhazards

preparedness programs led by the Department of Homeland Security, Federal strategies to enhance the nation's preparedness for disaster and attack have evolved over the course of the 20th century and into the 21st."

Unfortunately, who pushes the "GO" button is not certain. Is there an heirarchy? Who is in charge? Hawaii shows that an incoming missle is definitely the perview of the military. EAS is meant to be a mitigating factor when it comes to all kinds of life-threatening emergencies. But somebody has to be in charge at every level - local, regional, state, national, lawenforcement and military. Who is it that calls the shot at each level? And when? Isn't it curious that the EAS was never instituted during the fires that devastated Santa Rosa California and the Wine Country around it?

I alluded to this problem in my January 8th column. Each of the local, regional, state and national Emergency Management Agencies must have contingencies for every imaginable scenario - fire, flood, chemical spill, electrical grid failure, earthquake, typhoon, tornado, hurricane, volcano, plane and train crashes, incoming missiles ... and the list goes on forever!

But the root cause of the problem in making the system work has not changed since the beginnings of the Civil Defense system. The root cause drills down to nobody really knows who's in charge! Somehow, Doctor Strangelove comes to mind.

It seems just like they say: The more things change, the more they stay the same!

Thursday, January 25, 2018

Sunsweet Prunes

My wife Claudette and I met in 1961 in Gilroy, California, the garlic capitol of the world. There are two things about Gilroy that few people are aware of ... first, it's the last place you have clear skys before hitting the massive wall of smog generated by the San Francisco bay area - which magically appears just south of San Jose, between Morgan Hill and Gilroy. Second it's the reason Sunsweet prunes used to have such a unique taste.

The smog speaks for itself. Pack people, cars, trucks, trains and planes tightly in an area and their emissions will create smog, no matter what you do to mitigate it.

The unique taste of Sunsweet Prunes is the result (or used to be) of garlic fumes in the air! You see, the Sunsweet plant in Gilroy air-dried their prunes on big racks out in the open. Feelings

Last year I worked ever so slowly on my second book, a compendium of stories gathered from around the neighborhood and out of my head. So far, ¿Quién Sabe? Mas Historias de un Hombre Viejo (More Old Man's Stories) contains four stories about our human senses - hearing, seeing, smelling and tasting. That leaves one more: Feeling or touch. Here we go ...

Feeling can be broken into two parts - that which one feels with the heart, gut, or mind ... and that which one feels with one's body, skin, muscles or bones.

First, let's deal with the body. It's unlikely that you recall the difference between the comfort of your mother's womb and the cold, bright, loud delivery room. Those had to be some kinda scarey feelings! But, I can remember the touch of my mama's lips on the nape of my neck when I was little. Can you? Remember getting the bottom of your little feet tickled? How 'bout the first time you stubbed your toe? Wow!

How many of us remember when mom said, "Don't touch that burner - it will hurt you." How many of us just HAD to put our little fingers on that burner? Remember the feeling? Yowww! It hurt! It burnt! And it broke your mama's heart. Maybe those were some of your first feelings. (Well, the ones you can remember, anyway.)

Three things: I stepped on a board with a rusty nail in it. That hurt. Squeezed the pucture wound to make it bleed. That hurt, too. Went to the doctor, who checked it out, treated it, put a band-aid on it and gave me a Tetanus Shot. Ouch! That

Tetanus Shot ached for what seemed like a week. Odds are you've probably been there and done that ...

I have three scars on me from lacerations. One on my left arm from playing with a razor-blade, one on my right arm from playing with an axe, and one on my left shin, just above the ankle, from tripping over barbed wire. None was as gruesome as it may sound! I recall that none of them hurt as much as cutting one's finger with a kitchen knife. Instead, each of the lacerations was clean and just stung - yes, stung like an insect bite. Just lucky, I guess.

Before I got old I was six-foot-five. I've shrunk some since, but the same thing happens as when I was taller: I bang my head on things. I live in a Park Model mobile home. Back in the late fifties, when I was in high school, I used to bang my head on the cafeteria automatic door-closer all the time because they propped the doors open at lunch time. By the time I was a Senior, there were no bruises or scrapes on my head - but I was beginning to go bald. Speaking of entrances ... Ford and Chevy brought us the wrap-around windshield, making entering and leaving the car a chore for us tall people - banging our heads on the streetside edge that dratted window. As a result of banging into things with my head over the years, I can grow hair almost anywhere except the top of my head!

Next, let's work on the other feelings - hearbreak, fear, panic, loathing, joy, love, ecstacy, gut feelings and premonitions.

Heartbreak - usually involves loss ... you and your lover break up, your pet dies, or you loose a family member to age and infirmity. Maybe you witness a car or airplane crash where nobody survives. Heartbreaking.

The crashes or pending disasters like that create *fear* in everyone. Fear is what makes people want to turn away or run.

Many people go into full-out *panic* mode when disaster hits. Panic usually results when it seems there is no way out of a situation. It creates a kind of paralysis of both mind and body.

One of the worst human feelings is *loathing*. This is hatred so deep that a person could actually fly into a rage and take the life of another living thing.

Just the opposite is *joy*! I call it abject happiness - glee, if you will. It's the feeling that something has happened or is happening that makes you feel all warm and giggly and wonderful all over.

Love is such a special feeling that poets have written volumes on it and have scarcely stratched the surface. I guess love is a feeling of attachment, or of belonging or of preference. I love my wife and family. And I love chocolate-mint ice-cream!

Now, *ecstacy* is an order of magnitude greater than joy! Ecstacy is the feeling of being completely overcome with joy and happiness.

All of us have had *gut feelings* before. Gut feelings are almost like *premonitions*, but not quite as strange. Let's say that your car has almost bald tires on it and you have to drive across town some six or eight miles. You have this gut feeling that you're gonna have a flat before you get home. Different is the premonition that you're gonna have a flat just before you get to your destination across town, and sure enough - as you're pulling into that parking lot - BAM! Your gut feeling was telling you that it might be a good idea to get new tires

on the way across town. The premonition was a view into the future that predicted the outcome.

Feelings set us humans apart from each other and from the animals. I wonder what kind of feelings nature's creatures experience. Your pets, I'm pretty sure, experience love and happiness and fear and trepedation. But what about that little Praying Mantis lurking out there on the porch? And what about that fly he's stalking? I'd rather not go their either!

Thursday, February 1, 2018 Worse Than I Thought

What Pelosi risks with that line is a permanent rebranding that bumps Marie Antoinette off of history's list of the most unfeeling leaders." [Let them eat cake!]

What House Minority Leader Nancy Pelosi and Wasserman-Schultz, Representative Debbie Senator Elizabeth Warren and Senate Minority Leader Chuck **Schumer** (the *uber*-left of the Democrat Party) don't understand is that the rank and file aren't being fooled by their divisive rhetoric. Monday, February 12, 2018

DACA

Over the last couple of months Congressional Democrats have managed to dig themselves into a huge hole ... and kept digging! When none of the Dems in the Senate voted for the first Continuing Resolution to keep the government operating, it caused what many called the "Schumer Shutdown" - closing many government offices and providing no paychecks for employees for three days. Regular appropriations bills are the twelve standard bills that cover the funding for the federal government for one fiscal year and that are supposed to be enacted into law by October 1. If Congress has not enacted the regular appropriations bills by the time, it can pass a continuing resolution, which continues the pre-existing appropriations at the same levels as the previous fiscal year (or with minor modifications) for a set amount of time. The third type of appropriations bills are supplemental appropriations bills, which add additional funding above and beyond what was originally appropriated at the beginning of the fiscal year. Supplemental appropriations bills can be used for things like disaster relief."

Republicans constitute a simple majority of 51 in the Senate, but **Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell** wouldn't

invoke the "Nuclear Option" which would allow a simple majority to pass legislation like he did to approve appointments of Supreme Court Judges. Even **President Donald Trump** has called for the Nuclear Option to force Democrats in the Senate to act in a more bi-partisan way. Instead, Schumer caved in to the backlash from Middle America. As a result he became the recipient of ferocious attacks from the far left of the Democrat party. They were so upset that unruly crowds showed up at Schumer's home, demonstrating and pledging to keep him awake all night with their noise.

Schumer was caught in his own catch-22 ... by not allowing his people to pass the CR he created tremendous bad feelings across the country - not only among Republicans, but also among a broad cross-section of Dems and Independents. TV ads over the weekend shouted, "Democrats would rather support illegal aliens than fund our military!" CNBC posted a report that "Trump accused Democrats of 'turning down services and security for citizens in favor of services and security for non-citizens,' meaning the undocumented young people who were brought to this country as children by their parents ..."

The old saying goes, "When you find yourself in a hole, quit digging!" Schumer's mistake was not replacing the shovel with a ladder. By letting his Democrats vote for a three-week CR, he set the stage for an even more acrimonious fight in the Congress over DACA (Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals) instead of an actual budget for the remainder of FY-2017-18. Last week the CR they finally passed expired before the House could approve a new one based on compromises in the Senate. What resulted was one of the shortest government shutdowns in history - a matter of a few hours went by before they passed the new CR, which will expire on March 23rd. Because House Leaders promised to take up DACA this week

over Rand Paul's objections, the Bill included \$300 billion in new funding over the next two years, much of it for the military. Paul was furious because, he claimed, it would create a trillion-dollar budget deficit next year.

But really, the whole deal is about DACA. CNBC: "Senate Democrats are seeking a permanent fix for some 800,000 undocumented young people who were shielded from deportation under Obama-era DACA [Executive Order] rules until last fall, when President Donald Trump canceled the DACA program." Because of Trump's own Executive Order, DACA permits will expire March 5th. The President encouraged a compromise that would allow an additional million undocumented youngsters to apply for DACA protection, hoping that would draw more young people out of the shadows, where they have been living in fear of being deported.

The House and Senate minorities wanted DACA legislation adopted as separate part of any future budget agreement - they got what they wanted as a compromise to keep the government funded. They want permanent Green Cards for DACA kids going to college, being gainfully employed or serving in the American military. The President wants funding for the Border Wall promised during the election, an end to the immigrant lottery, and an end to "chain migration" in trade for permanent permits and a "path to US Citizenship" for up to 1.8 million DACA kids.

The spectre of young people defacing public and private property, disrupting the peace, participating in unruly demonstrations, flaunting Mexican Flags and carrying placards condemning the President doesn't sit well with a vast majority of Americans. Becoming a Naturalized US Citizen requires a working knowledge of how our government works, passing a test about those workings and the US Constitution,

becoming fluent in the written and spoken English language, obtaining gainful employment, assimilating into American society and professing an unswerving allegiance to the United States of America. Nothing more - nothing less.

The line has been drawn. Dreamers who won't join our continuing American quest for civil Life, Liberty and Pursuit of Happiness will meet with a huge surprise. They will not be welcome here anymore. The question remains ... will Schumer blink again?

Quoting intermittently from Wikipedia: "The Grapes of Wrath is an American realist novel published in 1939 and written by John Steinbeck ..." Frequently read in American high school and college book classes, it "won the National Book Award and Pulitzer Prize for fiction, and it was cited prominently when Steinbeck was awarded the Nobel Prize in 1962."

"Set during the Great Depression, [both the movie and] the the novel focuses on the Joads, a poor family of tenant farmers driven from their Oklahoma home by drought, economic hardship, agricultural industry changes, and bank foreclosures forcing tenant farmers out of work ...

"The narrative begins just after **Tom Joad** [played by Hernry Fonda] is paroled from McAlester prison, where he had been imprisoned after being convicted of homicide. On his return to his home near Sallisa, Oklahoma, Tom meets former preacher **Jim Casy**, whom he remembers from his childhood, and the two travel together. When they arrive at Tom's childhood farm home, they find it deserted. Disconcerted and confused, Tom and Casy meet their old neighbor, **Muley Graves**, who tells them the family has gone to stay at Uncle

John Joad's home nearby. Graves tells them that the banks have evicted all the farmers, but he refuses to leave the area.

"The next morning, Tom and Casy go to Uncle John's. Tom finds his family loading their remaining possessions into a Hudson Motor Car Company sedan converted to a truck; with their crops destroyed by the Dust Bowl, the family has defaulted on their bank loans, and their farm has been repossessed. Consequently, the Joads see no option but to seek work in California, described in handbills as fruitful and offering high pay.

"The Joads put everything they have into making the journey. Although leaving Oklahoma would violate his parole, Tom decides it is worth the risk, and invites Casy to join him and his family."

At the end of the movie, Tom has run into trouble with the law, is afraid his life is in grave danger, and is preparing to be on his way elsewhere. To ease his mother's fears he recites this cosmic sililoquy that has gone down in history as one of the most classic presentations of the way America's working man looks at life and its relation to the hereafter:

"Well ... maybe it's like Casy said.

"A fella ain't got a soul of its own ... jus' ... a little piece of a big soul ... the one big soul that belongs ta everybody. And ... an' it don't matter.

"I'll be all around in the dark. I'll be everywhere - wherever you can look.

"Wherever there's a fight so hungry people can eat - I'll be there. Wherever there's a cop beatin' up a guy - I'll be there. I'll be in the way guys yell when they're mad. I'll be in the way kids laugh when ... they're hungry and know supper is ready.

"And when the people are eatin' the stuff they raise 'n' ... livin' in the houses they build ... I'll be there, too.

"Just somethin' I been thinkin' about ..."

I was just thinkin', too ... last September, I wrote the following:

We know from *Genesis* that "In the beginning God created the Heavens and the Earth. And the Earth was without form, and void, and darkness was upon the face of the deep. And the Spirit of God moved upon the face of the waters." And when God said "Let there be light" there WAS light - the **Big** Bang, if you will. And there we were ... BANG! ... just like that - flying away into deep space at the speed of light, collecting in groups and clusters, creating the stars and the planets and their moons!

Our physical bodies are microcosms of the Universe that God created. Our mental processes operate by the same principles of physics that apply everywhere in the Universe. President Trump hosted a "listening session" to hear from survivors of the Parkland shooting, their parents and representatives of several school districts, seeking suggestions on how to bring this scourge to an abrupt halt. One school administrator from Washington, DC explained how - in one of the roughest sections of the city - his kids are safer at school than on the streets ... they adopted the way the TSA screens airline passengers - with metal detectors, baggage x-rays and greeters. Improvements to background checks, age limits, and types of firearms and accessories were also scrutinized during the Presidential hearing.

There are few politicians as loved as Southern Arizona's Gabby Giffords, the one who was shot in the head January 8th, 2011 at a rally in Northwest Tucson. Giffords, a three term 8th District Congresswoman, managed not only to survive the shooting but also to come back from her injuries to a full life with her astronaut husband Mark Kelly. The prominent Democrat, under the banner of the National Democrat Party, sent out several pleas of late. Unfortunately, they only demonstrated why the DNC will have a hard row to hoe this election cycle. To quote:

Friend --

I know politicians fear the gun lobby.

But I also know that fear cannot compare to what those innocent children in Florida felt as the gunshots rang out, bullets flew through the halls of their school, and their teachers and classmates were gunned down.

That fear is nothing compared to what parents must have felt

waiting in the parking lot of the high school waiting for news about their children.

Our nation's schools should be the safest spaces in our communities. They should not be the place of horror. And while I wish that the scenes from earlier this week were unthinkable or unimaginable, they are not.

We have seen them before, and we will see them again... unless our elected leaders show the courage to act -- the courage to finally take on the gun lobby.

But that will only happen when politicians realize they have more to fear from all of us together than they do from the gun lobby. And that starts with making our voices heard:

For a long time I bought into the fiction that after a horrific shooting, there is a required period of silence -- where we aren't supposed to act. I know people felt that way after I was shot, as well.

But the truth is, the only one who benefits from that waiting period is the gun lobby -- which is why their defenders offer little more than "thoughts and prayers" for the families and condemnations for anyone who demands that our communities deserve more.

In 2018, I am going to work tirelessly to ensure we elect a Congress that is willing to stand up to the gun lobby. And I know the Democratic National Committee will do the same.



Monday, February 26, 2018 Break Time for DACA

The US Senate couldn't agree on Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) so they went on a ten day break. They had voted on each of four Bills that tried to address the problem created by an Executive Order from former President Barack Obama. According to Heritage.org, "In March 2011, Obama said that with 'respect to the notion that I can just suspend deportations through executive order, that's just not the case.' In May 2011, he acknowledged that he couldn't 'just bypass Congress and change [immigration] law myself. ... That's not how a democracy works.'" Meanwhile, DACA kids demonstrated at the Capitol, urging the Senate to do something.

As I published last week, the course is set for the DACA ship: "They want permanent Green Cards for DACA kids going to college, being gainfully employed or serving in the American military. The President wants funding for the Border Wall promised during the election, an end to the immigrant lottery, and an end to 'chain migration' in trade for permanent permits and a 'path to US Citizenship' for up to 1.8 million DACA kids." The Senate couldn't find a way to put those four requirements together in a single Bill that would pass muster.

There are only two sticking points (as opposed to talking points) in the DACA quandary. A path to citizenship is seen as **Amnesty** by Conservative Republicans. Funding **The Wall** is seen by the Democrats as an unacceptable way to restrict immigration to America. They don't seem to be able to reach compromise on either issue. The Senate was unable to collect the required sixty votes to invoke cloture to cut off debate and pass a Bill ... any Bill. The only solution was suggested by the

President a while back - get rid of the Super-Majority requirement and let the majority agree to pass some Bills.

Earlier this year, **President Trump** issued an Executive Order that brings DACA to a halt on March 5th. That Order has been held in abeyance until the Courts have decided whether it can go forward. Two **Federal Courts** have issued Restraining Orders and the **Supreme Court** has discussed considering the issue - probably in June. Meanwhile DACA kids are left dangling.

The House is supposedly taking up the DACA discussion as it hammers together an Omnibus Bill to fund the Government through September 30th (the end of FY 2017-18). The Sticky Wicket is this: Conservative Republicans want DACA considered as a separate Bill and Liberal Democrats demand that DACA be included in the Omnibus Bill. On February 23rd, the President tweeted, "For those of you who are still interested, the Democrats have totally forgotten about DACA. Not a lot of interest on this subject from them!" Followed Saturday by, "Dems are no longer talking DACA! 'Out of sight, out of mind,' they say. DACA beneficiaries should not be happy. Nancy Pelosi truly doesn't care about them. Republicans stand ready to make a deal!"

Meanwhile, the Continuing Resolution to fund the Government, passed earlier this month, will expire on March 23rd. There have been five CRs this year. If Congress can't agree to pass the Omnibus Bill, there could be a sixth CR or a third shut-down. Good luck wid dat!

Thursday, March 1, 2018 Black Valentine

The day we celebrated Arizona's birthday this year, America received a Black Valentine that took the lives of seventeen people, mostly high school students, and it was unceremoniously delivered to Parkland, Florida.

The heinous crime was allegedly committed by a disturbed young man who had been enrolled in the Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School's JROTC program. Nikolas Cruz, 19, told police he was responsible for the shooting and added that he hid extra ammunition in his backpack and shot students in the hallways and on school grounds. The school's assistant football coach, it's athletic director, a geography teacher and cross-country coach as well as 14 students were killed with an AR-15 semi-automatic rifle. At least another 14 were injured and transported to area hospitals. Cruz, who had fled on foot, was stopped by a police officer in Coral Springs - two miles from the school - and was taken into custody without incident. He was charged with 17 counts of pre-meditated murder.

The coach, who was also a security guard, received no help from the School Resource Officer, who stayed outside the freshman building where the attack took place. Sheriff's Deputy **Scot Peterson**, 54, was outside for "upwards of four minutes" while students were gunned down inside. At a news conference the Sheriff said, "What I saw [in a video of the scene] was a deputy arrive ... take up a position and he never went in." Ninth grade English teacher **Felicia Burgin** said the criticism of Peterson is unfair. Peterson wouldn't have stood a chance against the gunman in hallways that were filled with students at the time. "There is no one that is going to tell you a negative thing about Deputy Peterson," she said. Peterson,

who stayed on his radio during the shooting, was suspended from duty without pay and subsequently retired. There remains the question of whether he was waiting for back-up or not. After the Sheriff came under extreme scrutiny late last week and early this week, it turns out that three more of his deputies crouched behind their squad car doors to avoid being shot by Cruz, who they thought at the time was out on the school grounds.

Three of Cruz' JROTC classmates were killed in the shooting - all were shielding other students when they died. Fifteen-year-old **Peter Wang** was called a hero. A White House petition was circulated calling for him to be buried with full military honors. Wang, **Alaina Petty**, 14, and **Martin Duque**, also 14, were posthumously honored by the U.S. Army with the ROTC Medal for Heroism at their funerals. Wang was buried in his JROTC Blues uniform. On February 20th, he was awarded a posthumous admission to the United States Military Academy at **West Point**.

President Trump held a "listening session" February 21st that lasted nearly an hour-and-a-half with affected Parkland kids, family members and teachers. Singled out by the media were the stories told by two people at the session. The first was a traumatized teen who watched helplessly as friends were gunned down. The other was Andrew Pollack who lost his daughter Meadow Pollack to the shooter just outside the school grounds. Referring to the University of Texas tower shooting that took 17 lives in August of 1966, he shouted passionately. "Should have been one school shooting and we should have fixed it! And I'm pissed because my daughter I'm not going to see again." Pollack angrily exclaimed, "This stuff has to stop!"

Mr. Trump met the next day with state and local officials to discuss school safety and floated the idea that "you can't hire

enough security guards" but teachers could carry concealed weapons and "nobody would know who they are." Teachers could go through "rigorous training" and could get "a little bit of a bonus." He stressed that many teachers have military and law enforcement backgrounds, so implementing such a plan would not be difficult. There was a lot of push-back from Liberals, Teachers' Unions and the media about the President's suggestion.

Later, Trump tweeted @realDonaldTrump Feb 22, "I will be strongly pushing Comprehensive Background Checks with an emphasis on Mental Health. Raise age to 21 and end sale of Bump Stocks! Congress is in a mood to finally do something on this issue - I hope!" The National Rifle Association doesn't like raising the age of legal purchase to 21 and NRA Chief Wayne LaPierre said as much last weekend.

From my vantage point, it appears that "the fix" is not one thing, but rather, a number of them. Enhancing the **Background Check** system and including mental health in its data can be done administratively. Raising the age one can purchase a firearm without parental permission might be another, if mandated by the Congress. I would say the age 21 issue should be tempered to include a few exceptions: If a person has served in the military and been honorably discharged, age should be of no concern and a parental sign-off should not be necessary, just a DD-214; and if a person is married and has reached the state's statutory age of majority, that should be an exception to the age 21 requirement, also. The **ATF** already has the responsibility for regulating Bump Stocks and can easily tighten up on them under the President's direction.

"Hardening" schools across the country is another story altogether. The first question I ran across on Facebook was

"Where is the money supposed to come from? Many low-paid teachers are never reimbursed for classroom supplies they pay for out-of-pocket. And many states have rolled back increases in funding for education. Is Congress going to underwrite the cost of ridding the country of 'Gun-Free' schools?" This, in my estimation, is an issue for state legislatures and individual school districts to address. Putting employees at risk should be a decision made as closely to those individuals as possible - and with their input.

President Trump had a bi-partisan meeting yesterday with House and Senate Leaders and the purveyors of a number of Bills in the hopper to do something about gun safety. When they were done with the publicly broadcast meeting, they parted in agreement to try to consolidate the Bills into one comprehensive batch of changes to the way guns are handled in America. Yesterday afternoon even Chuck Schumer came out in favor of the way Trump pushed for solutions.

All of the above is so much water under the bridge because, in my opinion, it's just so much political blather. When you come right down to it, it's like the elephant in the room - or the forest full of trees - we recognize neither the elephant nor the forest! As I see it, the biggest chore our country has, as it relates to all kinds of violence and unacceptable misbehavior, is to somehow induce in our children a healthy respect for authority at a very young age. And that's a tall order because today's Millennial and Gen-X moms and dads don't know how!

Monday, March 5, 2018 Guns & Abortion

Last week a couple of my Facebook friends got into a discussion about Guns and Abortion. Craig said "I'm not sure how people can support individual rights on the one hand yet want to limit them on the other hand." Scott blamed today's controversies on the Republicans. And it appeared to me that Craig concurred. So, I wrote the following [with editing since]:

Craig and Scott, you're both mistaken. Both of these issues are non-partisan, although, both Republicans and Democrats scrap over them all the time. Back in the day (when I was a Republican) the GOP platform was a very Conservative prochoice and the Dems (and Liberals) were anti-abortion. Now it's all golly-wompus upside-down - Republicans are pro-life and the Dems are pro-choice.

Was it Republicans who brought the issue of abortion to the Supreme Court? No. It was Texas resident Norma McCorvey who, under the pseudonym Jane Roe, sued Dallas County District Attorney Henry Wade, a Democrat, in 1970. Roe v Wade made it all the way to the SCOTUS and on January 22nd, 1973 the High Court recognized (7-2) that the constitutional right to privacy extends to a woman's right to make her own personal medical decisions - including the decision to have an abortion without interference from politicians.

That ruling has withstood the test of time (and many court tests) over the last 45 years. McCorvey was a Republican and the ruling was handed down by a Republican-dominated (Conservative) Court ... but she changed her stance (not her Party) in 1995 after being baptized in a back-yard swimming

pool by Rev. Philip "Flip" Benham, the head of the antiabortion group Operation Rescue. Although they banged heads over the issue for a long period of time, they became good friends. McCorvey hardened her conservative roots over time, and in 2008 she endorsed Ron Paul for President. She passed away in February of last year from complications of heart disease.

Although today's SCOTUS leans Conservative (5-4), it's doubtful that it would overturn Roe v Wade in the future, even with the change in stance by the Republican Party. When I was a leader in the Gila County Dem Party some years ago I had no stance on abortion. The Party was in transition and I believed that no man (or political entity) has any business telling a woman how to make her own medical decisions. I guess that was a pro-choice stance, although I've never been in favor of abortion. I believe McCorvey thought

the about the same at the time.

When it comes to guns and gun rights, I'm a staunch Conservative. The Second Amendment was penned to assure that America would always have a standing Army to protect it and its families. The Supreme Court has consistently ruled over the years that government (at all levels) has the right to place limits on the purchase of certain types of weapons (aka military) not in common use. *Common use* is the operative phrase that, incidentally, includes America's best-selling firearm, the AR-15 semi-automatic shoulder weapon.

Back in June of 2013 Pew Research published the following: "More than a third of Americans say they or someone in their household owns a gun." Today, there are by various estimates of anywhere from 270 million to 310 million guns in the United States - close to one firearm for every man, woman and child.

Pew's 2017 report includes this: "Gun ownership is more common among men than women, and white men are particularly likely to be gun owners. Among those who live in rural areas, 46% say they are gun owners, compared with 28% of those who live in the suburbs and 19% in urban areas. There are also significant differences across parties, with Republican and Republican-leaning independents more than twice as likely as Democrats and those who lean Democratic to say they own a gun (44% vs. 20%)." I never thought of gun ownership as a partisan issue - not as a Republican, nor as a Democrat and certainly not today as an NPD.

So, boys, I don't believe your arguments hold water because the vast majority of Americans could care less about political stances on either issue. Perhaps because, when you come right down to it, they are individual issues and, therefore, none of our collective business!

Thursday, March 8, 2018 Yellow Journalism

I read three newsmagazines every day: The **DrudgeReport**, **WND** and **RealClearPolitics**. Each provides links to news stories in both conservative and liberal newspapers such as The Wall Street Journal and the New York Times. There are also links to the CNN and Fox news sites. Also on my radar is access to almost any subject on **Wikipedia**, **Snopes** and **Google**. This way I can understand the many sides of just about any issue and how a story is being reported by the Mainstream Media. Also explored are the many interesting yet untold stories that don't make national or international news. A few things have become clear (at least to me) in the way the news is delivered to the people of America. Let me elaborate.

"Yellow" journalism flourishes across our country. By this I mean that many of today's wordsmiths craft the slant of a story based on their own social and political biases and beliefs. A local newspaper allowed this kind of journalism to be published on its front page a couple of weeks ago. Although I'm not naming the paper, its editor or the author, perhaps you'll understand what I'm talking about here after you've read it.

"Jess Bolinger tendered his resignation as Globe Regional Justice Court Judge. Bollinger gave notice to Gila County on February 1; his resignation will be effective February 28.

"Calls have been made to the Bureau of Alcohol and Firearms to substantiate a source's claim the the ATF pulled Bolinger's firearms license because of alleged illegal gun sales.

"It has been reported that Bolinger's pawn shop, Globe Gun & Pawn has been closed for several weeks. A hand-written sign taped on the door says, 'Business is Closed.'

"It is not yet known if Boliger's resignation is related to his pawn shop closing or if the ATF has pulled his firearms license, but I will continue to monitor this situation and bring you more as it..."

The way the story is reported, the reader gets the impression that Bolinger was forced to resign because, allegedly, he did something wrong. Such is not the case.

"Calls have been made" does not confirm the allegation of illegal gun sales. "A source's claim" is nonsense unless the source is named as well as the result of calls, answered or not returned. Without the name or position of an individual, claims are inconclusive at best.

"It has been reported" also gives no named source of the "closed for several weeks" claim.

"It is not yet known" is a phoney statement meant to plant a seed. This phrase is linked to an either/or choice that only goes to reinforce the readers' misunderstanding that Bolinger did a bad thing. He did not.

The fact is that Bolinger turned 67 earlier this year and did his homework on retirement. He learned that the sooner he retired the sooner he'd be making about a hundred bucks a month more than he was making as the JP. So, he decided to retire.

The claim about the pawn shop closing has nothing to do with ATF. An elderly lady operated the shop for Bolinger when he was the JP. About a year ago, her husband became deathly ill

and she could not work because she was caring for him. He passed away about a month later. She never came back to work and couldn't be replaced. Bolinger decided to close then ... not a few weeks ago. He has since sold or auctioned off the majority of his stock.

It is true that the federal **Gun Control Act** (GCA) requires that people engaged in the sale of firearms be licensed by the **Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives** (ATF). Federal firearms licensees (**FFL**) are critical partners in promoting public safety. Although I have no first-hand information on the subject, I know that Bolinger has not given up his FFL and will not do so unless or until he has sold his personal holdings. (Let me say here that Jess is retired now and might want something to do ... could that be operating a pawn shop?)

You should be able to understand by now ... how words can be twisted to make something completely innocent appear to be on the verge of criminality. This chicken-sh*t technique is used by many in the mainstream media - and at least one local reporter - to cast people of otherwise good character in a bad light. This is exactly why both print and electronic news is no longer trusted by a majority of Americans.

According to the **Knight Foundation**, "Results of the 2017 Gallup/Knight Foundation Survey on Trust, Media and Democracy show that most Americans believe it is now harder to be well-informed and to determine which news is accurate. They increasingly perceive the media as biased and struggle to identify objective news sources. They believe the media continue to have a critical role in our democracy but are not very positive about how the media are fulfilling that role." All it would take - I think - is for editors to require journalists to report their sources. In other words ... no sources - no story.

This story hurts me a lot. It pains me to say that a well read and well received newspaper would allow a reporter with a personal grudge against an extended family of upstanding character and service peddle unverified information that holds them in a bad light. I have to fault the publisher for not knowing of the vendetta that has been going on for more than a decade. And that hurts.

In my opinion, there is little difference between Yellow Journalism and Yellow Snow!

Monday, March 12, 2018 Hey, Yo! Negotiate This!

President Trump has held several meetings with political operatives from the US House and Senate over the last month or so, making liberals and the mainstream media crazy. The fourteen-year host of **The Apprentice** is an accomplished host and expert at leading meetings of minds. The man can charm the pants off the crustiest politicians and find common ground where anybody else could find nothing but acrimony. President Donald John Trump is perhaps the best negotiator on the planet. That must be true ... he wrote the book on it! *The Art Of The Deal*. Thursday, March 15, 2018 Media Hype Continues

A little over a week ago the **New York Times** reported, "Texans voted on Tuesday in primary elections marked by widespread infighting. Democrats have been clamoring to flip three congressional seats in districts that Hillary Clinton won in 2016. But in recent weeks, establishment Democrats have had to grapple with progressive candidates, and far-right Republicans have set their sights and advertising dollars on moderate Republicans."

Over the last few weeks, the mainstream media has been reporting that Democrats are ramping up for big wins in Congressional races across the country. As usual of late, the media is blowing up, out of all proportion, the premise that if Dems can get their voters to turn out at the polls they'll win elections. Last week the MSM was crowing about the Yuuuge increase in registered Democrats in Texas and how that will make the difference in the 2018 elections.

Well, overall in Texas, the number of voters who actually turned out was incredible! Some 1,037,054 people voted Democrat in the U.S.Senate race while 1,541,281 voted Republican. The GOP winner with 99% reporting was **Ted Cruz** with 1,315,468. Democrat **Beto O'rourke** garnered 641,129 votes - less than half of the amount Cruz got. There are 15,249,541 registered voters in Texas. Texas doesn't register voters by political party ... they can vote in whatever primary they want - but just one! 2,578,335 voted in Texas roughly 16% of those registered.

In the race for Governor, Democrats Lupe Valdez and Andrew White will spar in a runoff election in the Spring. Between them they got 714,953 votes. Meanwhile,

Republican incumbent Governor **Greg Abbott** collected some 1,390,236 votes, almost double the top two Dems. So, that begs the question: Where were those throngs of newly registered Democrats? Were they voting for Republicans? Or just staying home with the other 84% of registered voters? There's a 1984 **Alabama** song, "*If you're gonna play in Texas, you gotta have a fiddle in the band.*" As I see it, the **DNC** has dropped the ball. They claim to have their ground game in super shape with thousands of organizers and volunteers "working hard" to turn out the vote. But apparently, that doesn't play in Texas.

There's a difference in approach between the two parties. Take fund-raising, for instance. I'm on the email donor lists of both Parties and get at least three requests per day - every day - for small donations. The Dems want between a dollar minimum to whatever you can afford. The GOP asks for \$3.00 to \$500.00. Is it any wonder the RNC is outperforming the DNC in fundraising? (There's an old sales saying: "If you don't ask for what you want, you're not going to get it.") The GOP is outperforming the Dems because it asks for three times as much! There's also a Biblical saying: "Ask and ye shall receive."

BloombergPolitics reported late in January:

"The Republican National Committee said it raised \$132.5 million during the first year of Donald Trump's presidency, a record in a non-election year. The Democratic National Committee reported \$65.1 million.

"As of Dec. 31, the RNC said it had \$38.8 million in the bank. That's almost six times more than the \$6.5 million reported by the DNC. The RNC also reported zero debt, while the DNC owes \$6.1 million."

Today's Word: Pragmatism

A piece published by conservative columnist **Charles Krauthammer** caught my eye the other day. It was about why he appreciates President **Donald J Trump**. Now, hold on, my more liberal friends. This is good stuff! (I try to give you the REALLY good stuff.) Some excerpts from it:

"Definition: A pragmatist is someone who is practical and focused on reaching a goal. A pragmatist usually has a straightforward, matter-of-fact approach and doesn't let emotion distract him or her.

"I neither view nor do I believe Trump views himself as a conservative. It [is] my opinion that Trump is a pragmatist. He sees a problem and understands it must be fixed. He doesn't see the problem as liberal or conservative, he sees it only as a problem. That is a quality that should be admired and applauded, not condemned. But I get ahead of myself.

"Viewing problems from a Liberal perspective has resulted in the creation of more problems, more entitlement programs, more victims, more government, more political correctness, and more attacks on the working class in all economic strata.

"Viewing things according to the so-called Republican conservative perspective has brought continued spending and globalism to the detriment of American interests and well being, denial of what the real problems are, weak, ineffective, milquetoast, leadership that amounts to Barney Fife Deputy Sheriff, appeasement oriented and afraid of its own

shadow. In brief, it has brought liberal ideology with a pachyderm as a mascot juxtaposed to the ass of the Democrat Party.

"Immigration isn't a Republican problem, it isn't a Liberal problem, it is a problem that threatens the very fabric and infrastructure of America. It demands a pragmatic approach not an approach that is intended to appease one group or another.

- "(2) they are unaccustomed to hearing a president speak who is unencumbered by the financial shackles of those who he owes vis-a-vis donations;
- "(3) he is someone who is free of idiomatic political ideology;
- "(4) he says what he is thinking, is unapologetic for his outspoken thoughts, speaks very straightforward

using everyday language that can be understood by all (and is offensive to some who dislike him anyway) making him a great communicator, for the most part, does what he says he will do and;

"(5) he is someone who understands that it takes more than hollow promises and political correctness to make America great again.

"I submit that a pragmatist is just what America needs right now. People are quick to confuse and despise confidence as arrogance, but that is common among those who have never accomplished anything in their lives

"Donald Trump put his total financial empire at risk in running for president and certainly did not need or possibly even want the job; that says it all. He wants success for the U.S. and her citizens because he loves his country!"

Dr. Krauthammer was paralyzed from the waist down from a swimming accident during his first year in medical school and in the many years since has earned the admiration of his peers and a reputation as a great practitioner of logic and common sense. After recovering from the trauma of his accident, he returned to med school and went on to graduate from **Harvard School of Medicine** to become an MD in Psychology. He eventually abandoned his medical practice and turned to political commentary. The man knows that of which he speaks. His own pragmatism has made him a shining example, for anyone with doubts or disabilities, of what any individual can accomplish. Today he writes political columns for the **Washington Post** and the **Weekly Standard** and appears regularly on **Fox News**.

Last August Krauthammer disappeared from his panel post on Special Report with Bret Baier. He sent Baier - a good friend - a note in mid-February updating his condition after serious surgery. "Things are progressing steadily slower than I would like, but steadily," the Krauthammer message said. "Still I wish I could give you - and myself - a better idea of when this marathon ends. I am sure it is strange for your viewers that a regular panelist should disappear for months without warning and without any real explanation. After my surgery, there were serious complications that took several months to stabilize," the message continued. "My improvement has finally allowed me to concentrate on intensive rehabilitation to recover my strength and stamina. This too is progressing well but as usual is intense and slow. Nonetheless, I am determined to make it back. I've got to - I can't let you guys have all the fun."

Monday, March 26, 2018 Blood of the Lamb

Connor Lamb won the special election earlier this month for the Pennsylvania District 18 House Seat by 627 votes. There remained about 375 uncounted provisional, military and overseas ballots to be counted after the final election count was reported, not enough to change the results. However, Lamb will have to run again later this year in the mid-term election for the new court-reorganized Congressional District.

Lamb's win pointed the way for Dems to win House and Senate seats. Unfortunately, most of the Democrat base along the Left and East coasts is not enamored of Lamb's conservatism. He won for two reasons. First, he's a well-spoken, very attractive man with an un-mistakable air of confidence. Second, his campaign focused on the very things that won the same area of the state for President **Donald Trump**.

Marbles in the Overhead

There's been a lot of goofy talk about guns and gun control for the last month or so. It's been making me crazy! So crazy that I'm pitching a handful of marbles in the overhead to get the good Captain's attention.

Would someone kindly tell me what keeping our kids safe in school has to do with gun control? LA Times writer Curtis Lee wrote in January that "489 people were killed in unintentional shootings in the U.S. in 2015, the most recent year for which data is available. That was down from 824 deaths in 1999, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention." A misleading statistic from CNN claims that "about 1500 people are accidentally killed by firearms every year." When you throw in school shootings the count doesn't rise significantly. This doesn't compare at all with the carnage that happens on America's streets, roads, highways and Interstate Highways. The National Safety Council estimated that 40,100 people were killed in 2017 accidents. So why the big deal about gun control to keep our kids safe at school?

So, here it is, troops ... Kids in our schools need to feel safe from:

- * Bullies
- * Gangs
- * Lunch-money thieves
- * Knives
- * Baseball Bats
- * Sexual predators* Stolen pistols, BB Guns and Pellet Guns
- * Explosives, and caustic liquids
- * Swords* Long guns

In that order, mind you!

How come, compared to all that, there's this big rush to change gun laws? Why can't we protect our kids (at whatever grade level) the same way we protect our malls and grocery stores, our airports and bus stations, our concert venues and sports facilities? When are our elected officials going to start paying attention to common sense instead of the loudest squeaker of the wheels?

A recent **Fox News** poll shows a majority of people support a number of gun control measures. The poll - unveiled on *Fox News Sunday* on Palm Sunday - shows 53 percent of the people interviewed say "protecting citizens from gun violence" is more important than "protecting the rights of citizens to own guns."

The breakdown for support on individual gun control measures is as follows:

91% support universal background checks, "including those buying at gun shows, private sales."

84% support mandatory mental health checks on "all gun buyers."

72% support raising the minimum legal age to 21.

69% support putting armed guards in schools.

60% support a ban on "assault rifles and semi-automatic weapons."

37% support the proposal touted by the President to have teachers and school officials armed.

According to the poll, a majority of people consider it important for Congress to pass gun control legislation. However, 43% say it's "not at all" likely that they will actually get it done.

The Fox poll shows clearly that a majority of the people interviewed have no clue about the reasons the founding fathers included the Second Amendment to the U S

Constitution. Let me reitterate from an earlier column: "The Second Amendment was penned to assure that America would always have a standing Army to protect it and its families. The Supreme Court has consistently ruled over the years that government (at all levels) has the right to place limits on the purchase of certain types of weapons (aka military) not in common use. Common use is the operative phrase that, incidentally, includes [one of] America's best-selling firearms, the AR-15 semi-automatic shoulder weapon."

Whoever it was at Fox News that suggested outlawing semiautomatic weapons is misinformed. Most of the handguns sold these days are semi-automatic - like the Glock 9mm and the Walther 22LR. These are the weapons that protect their carriers at home. These are the center of the on-going battle for open- and concealed-carry laws - like those in Florida and Arizona that have been largely responsible for over-all reductions in violent crime in those and other states as well. That's mainly true because the crooks can't tell who's packin' any more!

I'm all for background checks that include mental health, an "age of majority" provision except for written parental or spousal permission, armed SROs (school resource officers), trained and certified school staff concealed carriers, nationwide open- and concealed-carry reciprocity, and outlawing the sale of automatic military weapons to civilians.

I would include semi-automatic military weapons except that the M1 Garand 30 calibre semi-automatic shoulder weapon is not only a revered classic left over from the Korean War but also a great deer rifle. Also included in that class would be the notorious AK-47, developed in the Soviet Union by Mikhail Kalashnikov, and the AR-15 made in America by Anderson, Smith & Wesson, Armalite, Daniel, Colt, Rock River and Sig Sauer.

Texas Attorney General **Ken Paxton** wrote the following for **The Hill** on March 24th:

"Texas allows school districts to approve 'marshals' or 'guardians' as the last line of defense against a shooter. Under this program, faculty members volunteer to keep a firearm within reach in case the unthinkable happens. They undergo mental health screenings and rigorous firearm safety training - in some cases they are held to a higher standard than police officers.

"In an active shooter situation, law enforcement takes roughly three minutes to respond on a good day (through no fault of their own). It's disturbing to consider the damage that can be inflicted in that amount of time. Only school marshals - who, contrary to the media portrayal, represent a select few trained and capable staff members - can deliver response times measured in seconds rather than minutes.

"Coverage in the aftermath of Parkland has focused disproportionately on the AR-15. The gun has been established as a symbol of mass shootings, a device designed for wanton destruction. What use, we are repeatedly asked, could private citizens have for an AR-15? Texans like myself have been frustrated by this collective amnesia. On November 5, 2017, a private citizen heroically stopped the fleeing shooter of the First Baptist Church in Sutherland Springs using an AR-15.

"Those willing to kill the innocent in cold blood will hardly be hindered by a new gun regulation. ... it defies logic that they will respect a gun law. It stands to reason, therefore, that schools should be made a hard target, just like airports, stadiums and government buildings. ... student safety shouldn't have to hinge on the intractable gridlock of Washington politics.

"A sign outside of Argyle High School, which has opted into the program, reads "Please be aware that the staff at Argyle are armed and may use whatever force is necessary to protect our students." Is a would-be shooter more likely to

target such a school or a "gun-free zone?" The answer is obvious."

David Unsworth wrote the following in the **Washington Examiner** last Tuesday:

"Heart disease kills an estimated 614,348 per year. Cancer comes in second at 591,699 deaths per year. Chronic lower respiratory diseases (including emphysema, bronchitis, and asthma) are third, at 147,101 people a year. Accidents kill about 136,000 per year. Strokes kill 133,033 ...

"Needless to say, these figures vastly exceed the death toll from school shootings, mass shootings, and gun violence in general. A typical year in the US usually records 33,000 gunrelated deaths, two-thirds of which are suicides. The 12,000 gun-related homicides a year are, unsurprisingly, heavily concentrated in inner-city neighborhoods afflicted by drugs, gangs, and crime ...

"So, yes, angry young men who shoot up schools are a serious problem. Yet, the idea that they pose the gravest clear and present danger to the safety of America is preposterous. The American public should really be directing its attention to ensuring that we live healthier lives; not worrying about the astronomical odds of being involved in a school shooting. When it comes to tragically preventable deaths, one can make a compelling case that smoking, soft drinks, refined sugars, fast food, processed food, office work, and Netflix are far more dangerous to our well-being than guns or school shooters. Our public policy should be driven by data and facts, not opinions and hysteria."

Look, people, I'm out of marbles ... hope you have some of your own to send to Washington!

Thursday, April 5, 2018 Show Me Your Budget

They were all cranky about the Omnibus Bill a while back. And President Trump was about as cranky as he could be in public, considering all the three- and four-letter words he could use.

This is what I want to hear very soon from my President to the Congress:

"I want a complete 2018-19 one-year budget assembled under Regular Order before the end of September - with all the bells and whistles - like you guys are supposed to do every year ... not a Continuing Resolution. You need to get off your butts and do your job! Take this to the bank: I will not sign another Continuing Resolution and I will not sign another Omnibus Bill. This country is supposed to run like a business ... and it's time we made that happen again. If you send me anything other than a for-real, in-the-trenches, American budget for 2018-19, I will veto it. That will shutter this government and you people will take the heat until you've created a real honest-to-goodness Budget for the United States of America."

The first year a President is in office the country operates under the previous year's budget. President Trump's first year was under the Obama 2016-17 budget - or rather the series of Congressional Continuing Resolutions. The last full budget was the 2007-08 Bill. 2008-09 was passed by the Congress in April of 2009 after a series of Continuing Resolutions. There has not been a budget created by the Congress since.

But, according to **Pew Research**, "in the four decades since the current system for budgeting and spending tax dollars has been in effect, Congress has managed to pass all its required appropriations measures on time only four times: in fiscal 1977 (the first full fiscal year under the current system), 1989, 1995 and 1997.

"The 'standard' appropriations process, as laid out in the 1974 Congressional Budget Act, goes like this: After the president submits his budget proposal, the House and Senate adopt their own budget resolution. While it doesn't have the force of law, the budget resolution sets out the overall spending framework for the coming fiscal year and serves to guide lawmakers as they address specific tax and spending decisions.

"Next, Congress is supposed to pass a series of separate bills funding various agencies and activities of the federal government. (For the past decade, the number of spending bills has stood at 12, one for each subcommittee of the House and Senate appropriations committees.) The deadline for doing that is Oct. 1, when the new fiscal year starts. But since 1997, Congress has never passed more than a third of its regular appropriations bills on time, and usually has done considerably less than that: For instance, for six straight years (fiscal 2011 through 2016), not a single spending bill was passed by Oct. 1.

"And rather than pass stand-alone spending bills as it's supposed to, Congress has increasingly used omnibus bills (which bundle several appropriations measures into a single, giant law) and full-year CRs to resolve annual spending disputes. The first such omnibus measure was passed in 1950 as a one-off experiment, and omnibus spending bills were used a couple of times in the mid-1980s. However, they've become much more frequent in the past two decades: In each of the past seven fiscal years, in fact, all or nearly all of the regular appropriations bills were combined into such after-deadline package deals.

"If a deadline passes without either a new set of spending bills or another CR to fund the government, operations considered nonessential would be forced to shut down. In a lengthy shutdown, as occurred in October 2013, applications for things like drilling permits, small-business loans and export licenses might not be processed; museums and national parks might have to close; government statistical reports could be delayed; and hundreds of thousands of federal workers could be furloughed. (During the 2013 shutdown, some 800,000 federal workers were furloughed while 1.3 million others had to stay on the job without knowing when they'd be paid.) But mail would still be delivered, Social Security payments would be made, and workers deemed essential to protecting life or property (such as air traffic controllers and personnel at veterans' hospitals) would still get paid."

President Trump and the OMB submitted the FY2018-19 Budget Request and Analysis to the Congress on February 12th. On Easter Sunday April 1st (April Fool's Day) the Senate Budget Committee was to submit its "concurrent resolution," a precursor to Congress's budget resolution. I can't say for sure, but I'd bet money they were fashionably late rather than early! April 15th is the deadline for Congress to pass its budget resolution to guide decision-making for the twelve appropriation subcommittees, which begin hearings on specific proposals that can last into the summer. Is there any chance at all that this bunch of ne'er-do-wells will Git-R-Done by September 30th? That, my friends, remains to be seen ...

Monday, April 9, 2018 Who Cares?

One thing I learned as a broadcast DeeJay and journalist ... the bottom line is "Who cares?" Perhaps that's why the news media is so screwed up today. They're not asking "Who cares?"

No, really ... do you know anybody who lost sleep because eleven or twelve years ago Donald J. Trump had a fling with some pornstar who, until lately, nobody had ever heard of? Who cares?

Where on earth did the idea come from that the White House is a shambles because the President keeps firing people? This President will not put up with Department Heads, employees and/or advisors who take issue with him publicly or through "leaks" to the MSM. Thursday, April 12, 2018 Go Ahead - Make My Day

Guns and gun control have been center-stage for more than a month, now. Municipalities, Counties, States and the Congress have been gnashing their teeth over ways to curtail gun violence. There have been a lot of proposals, including one from a former US Supreme Court Justice suggesting that the Second Amendment be jettisoned.

Thursday, April 19, 2018 Strike Benefits

How long can a strike go on before the costs exceed the benefits? Good question, especially for teachers who have been striking or threatening to strike for better wages. For the sake of discussion, let's assume that a tenured teacher is paid \$52,000 a year. Weekly pay is \$1,000.

Here's the math to determine the amout of pay given up while on strike:

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1 \text{ wk} - \text{loss} = 1000
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2 wk - loss = 2000

3 wk - 10ss = 3000

4 wk - loss = 4000

5 wk - loss = 5000

6 wk - loss = 6000

Just one week off the job for a 10% raise only nets about 8.1%. This is called the Law of Diminishing Returns! Do the math:

52,000 + 5,200 (10%) = 57,200 - 1,000 (strike cost) = \$56,200. So, a one week strike costs the teacher \$1,000 in lost pay, but it's successful in getting the raise. But considering the cost, the increase in pay over time is just \$4,200, an increase of roughly 8.1%. The strike loss is not made up until the new contract goes into effect ... and then it's only in monthly increments.

Striking 5 weeks for a 10% raise to \$57,200 will net only \$200 in extra pay. Do the math:

52,000 + 5,200 (10%) = 57,200 - 5,000 (strike cost) = \$52,200.

The math is the same for six weeks, but a 10% raise won't cover the cost of being on strike.

Striking 6 weeks for a 10% raise to 57,200 will create a net loss of \$800. Again, do the math:

52,000 + 5,200 (10%) = 57,200 - 6,000 (strike cost) = \$51,200.

Some Unions give their members a stipend when on the picket line, but rarely enough to make up the loss in pay by not being at work.

Strikers going for a 20% increase as a bargaining tool are more likely to get a raise, but only if they strike for a week as a last resort. And there is always the danger of being fired for not showing up for work. That's not unprecidented.

Remember when President Reagan fired 11,000 Air Traffic Controllers who refused to show up for work on August 5th, 1981. When they went on strike he hired new ones. The skies were not crippled, as the PATCO Union had predicted. Things just slowed down a little as new employees came on board. PATCO was decertified in October of that year. The odd thing about that episode in American history is Reagan had been President of SAG/AFTRA (the Screen Actors Guild), one of the most powerful Unions in the country, from 1946 to 1960!

Union or not - contract or not - if the boss orders you to go back to work and you don't show up, you can be fired. Keep that in mind when bargaining for a raise.

Monday, April 23, 2018 Stupid Stories

One of the things that makes journalism (ok, old-style journalism) fun ... is the art of finding and reporting stupid stories. Here are a few examples that were out there recently.

There was this bank-robber who waited patiently in line to speak with a teller. (I swear, I heard this on the car radio!) When the robber got to window at the 17th Street Bank in Brooklyn, he whipped out a hand-printed note demanding all the money in the teller's drawer. It was January 25th. The teller very forcefully told the bank-robber there was no way she was giving up any money from her drawer so he might as well just leave. He snatched the note back, stormed out the front door, jumped in the waiting get-away car and has not been heard from since!

Then, there was the one about the two Florida kids, Rojelio Sebastian, 14, and Miguel Garcia, 12, who 'jacked the car belonging to a Domino's Pizza delivery man, only to fail because it didn't have an automatic transmission and neither one of them could drive a stick! Thursday, April 26, 2018 About Teachers

My mom was a teacher. Her first job was at the Quarter-Circle-V-Bar ranch in Mayer, AZ. My dad was into recreation and was the Rec Director at the VA in Tucson as well as in Petaluma and Monterey, CA. He went into the education business as an Athletic Coach and Math teacher at Pacific Grove High School. Mom taught at Fremont Junior High near Monterey. Both Mom and Pop earned their Teaching Certificates at NAU in Flagstaff, AZ. Neither earned a tremendous amount of money from their work, but they earned tenure and went to Summer College at NAU to get the annual raises that came with it.

I asked my Dad one day why my Mom wasn't making as much money as he was ... and he replied, "Education." Summer School for teachers is a must if they expect to better their station in life. After a move to Tucson, Pop took a year off to collect the information he needed for his Doctorate. He earned his Doctorate at the UofA. He was a Dorm Resident at the UofA at the time to help make ends meet. He explained that educators don't make as much money as other professionals. He said they are devoted to their craft and to their kids. "There is nothing more rewarding than meeting a kid, who used to be in your class, all grown up and successful with a family and a great job," he said.

He used to grouse about "those jerks" trying to organize teachers into Unions, taking their minds away from their jobs and stirring them up about how "poor" they were. Monday, April 30, 2018 Critical Thinking

The other day I was day-dreaming, just sitting in my living room, mind wandering. Heck, the older you get the easier it is to let your mind wander. I hope I don't get lost one of these days! Letting one's mind wander is an easy way to strengthen the muscles in the mind that do the heavy-lifting involved in critical thinking. Critical thinking is one of the greatest tools to sort out the pros and cons of all sorts of discussions - science, religion, education, politics, even cooking!.

So, exactly what is critical thinking? We read about it. We have heard famous orators speak about it. All great scientists swear by it. The best educators try to teach young people from a very early age how to think critically. But somehow, the vast majority of humans have skipped over or ignored the benefits of this skill. Those who cannot think critically can be swayed by just about any smooth-talker - be it sales, politics, religion, science, education - non-critical thinkers are like cattle - commonly referred to on our social media as "sheeple."

According to www.criticalthinking.org, "Everyone thinks. It is our nature to do so. But much of our thinking, left to itself, is biased, distorted, partial, uninformed, or downright prejudiced. Yet, the quality of our life and that of what we produce, make, or build depends precisely on the quality of our thought. Shoddy thinking is costly, both in money and in quality of life. Excellence in thought, however, must be systematically cultivated.

"Critical thinking is that mode of thinking - about any subject, content, or problem - in which the thinker improves the quality of his or her thinking by skillfully taking charge of the

structures inherent in thinking and imposing intellectual standards upon them.

"Critical thinking is, in short, self-directed, self-disciplined, self-monitored, and self-corrective thinking. It presupposes assent to rigorous standards of excellence and mindful command of their use. It entails effective communication and problem solving abilities and a commitment to overcome our native egocentrism and sociocentrism."

Autonomy and critical thinking are linked ... at least in my mind. It's very difficult to work autonomously because most employers don't want their employees wandering off on their own trying to find better ways to do stuff - mostly because it usually costs money rather than creating new income or reducing costs.

I was fortunate in my broadcast engineering career. As Chief Engineer at a number of radio stations I was free to come up with new ideas. I re-built two stations from the ground up and incorporated new and unique ways of doing things that made it easier for staff members (and deejays) to do their jobs. There were advances in broadcast engineering and technical advances involved that actually made it into the print media at the time.

At **Hughes Aircraft** in Tucson (now **Raytheon**) I was given my head to create new ways to save money in the manufacturing process. I saved the company over two million dollars by finding better ways to build its products. Without autonomy and the critical thinking that comes with it, that would have never happened.

James Fallows, a national correspondent for *The Atlantic*, penned the following for the May 2018 issue: "The challenge of journalism is always to make what's important interesting.

This is hard enough in the best of circumstances. It's harder when the reality you're conveying involves a mixture of developments both encouraging and alarming, rather than a stark exposé or a success story. It's harder still when the reality involves TV and video. And it is nearly impossible in the case of cable-news channels, above all politically driven ones like Fox. What 24-hour cable news [CNN] introduced and Fox perfected in the modern news consciousness is an unending stream of horrors from ... somewhere else. The natural result of well-meaning liberal media is thus a kind of pity for the heartland, and of conservative media, a survivalist fear about what people Out There are trying to get away with."

The problems I grapple with on a daily basis usually involve critical thinking - or lack of it - on somebody's part. My columns are the result of daily research, delving into the truth of the stuff that's out there, and trying to sort out real facts. They also involve some sort of entwined intuition based on decades of critical thinking, the purpose of which is to ferret out the things we can all accept as gospel. (Sometimes, to be honest, this just makes my brain hurt!)

The next time you have an opportunity to word-wrestle with a friend (or political foe) remember to step back some and do your critical thinking. Try to find the middle-ground ... together.

Thursday, May 3, 2018 Voter Registration Down

Democrats are having a hard time in Arizona, despite what their top leadership is feeding to the lyin' Mainstream Media. Total voter registration in Arizona since October last year is down.

At the start of the 2017-18 Fiscal Year Arizona's total voter registration stood at 3,655,316. As of March 1st this year it stood at 3,610,377, down some 44,939. The worst hit by the decline was the Democrat Party which lost 16,365 compared to a GOP loss of just 9,754. Actually, that isn't true: Independent registration declined by a whopping 28,820, more than the Republicans and Democrats combined!

So, the question is ... where did all those voters go? Did 44,939 voters die since October? Death purges voter registration in Arizona. The County Health Department notifies the State Health Department of the death - which then notifies the State Department - which purges the name from the State voter records and then notifies the County Recorder, who purges the name from the County records. Did some 45,000 folks pass since last October?

Could be ... November, December, January and February are the months when older folks pass on as a result of illness exacerbated by the Winter season - many die from reactions to Flu and Pneumonia shots every year. Is it possible that almost 45,000 people died for a number of reasons, including old age and reactions to annual shots or changes in the seasons? Nope!

We checked with the Arizona Department of Health Services (ADHS) and found that only 27,378 people died in all of

Arizona between October 1st, 2017 and March 31st this year. So, of the 44,939 voters whose registration was cancelled, what happened to the remaining 17,561? Were all of those voters purged from the rolls? If so, was it because they failed to vote in the 2016 Presidential election? Well, in Arizona, voter registration can changed from active to inactive when a person fails to vote in a Presidential election, as they can in some other states.

Here is some background information courtesy of MotherJones.com: "Willie Miller was born in 1948 in Noxubee County, Mississippi, an agricultural community along the state's eastern border named after a Choctaw word that translates roughly to "stinks like fish." As a teenager, she saw the civil rights movement transform the region, where previously no African Americans had been registered to vote. In 2000, Miller, who is black, was elected to the Noxubee County Election Commission, and she's been reelected every four years since. Today, the county of 11,000 is more than 70 percent African American and has a poverty rate nearly three times the national average. 'You got a few that's gonna crawl out of the cotton fields and go on and do something else with their lives, and most of them are gonna leave,' Miller says. For those who stay, Miller does her best to make sure they're able to vote.

"In June 2014, Miller and her four fellow election commissioners received a letter threatening legal action if they did not purge voters from the rolls. The letter came from the American Civil Rights Union (ACRU), a Virginia-based group that has fashioned itself in recent years as a conservative counterpart to the ACLU. The ACRU requested that the commissioners reduce the number of registered voters by the midterm elections that fall because, it claimed, there were more people registered than there were voting-age citizens in the county. The commissioners wanted to fight

back, but lacking the funds to hire an attorney, they decided not to respond and waited to see what would happen next.

"The letter they had received was one of many that the ACRU had started sending to small, rural counties across Mississippi, Texas, Kentucky, Alabama, and Arizona the year before. These letters were part of a legal campaign spearheaded by three former Justice Department officials from the George W. Bush administration to purge voter rolls across the country. The effort began in remote areas with few resources for legal defense, but recently it's expanded to include population centers in key swing states. Voting rights advocates worry that the campaign is targeting minorities and likely Democratic voters."

Could it be that Arizona took four years to comply with the 2014 ACRU demand letter? I couldn't find any other specific information about that in Arizona, but my friend **Sadie Jo Bingham**, Gila County, AZ Recorder, gave me a few other reasons a voter's registration can be removed or status changed. Anyone convicted of a felony has certain rights removed including the right to possess a deadly weapon and the right to vote. When a person becomes incapable of caring for oneself and property, that person's voter registration can be ordered deleted by a court. And when a person moves to a new address and fails to respond to queries from the Recorder their status can be changed to inactive. By the way, Sadie Jo told me that Gila County's voter rolls have grown, "In October 2017 there were 30,554 registered voters and as of March 2018 there were 30,839."

So, could there be some 17,561 Arizona residents who fall into those assorted categories? Probably. Consider that in November of 2016 there were a total of 221,170 felons in Arizona. I couldn't locate the information on how many were convicted between October 2017 and March 2018, but I'd bet

it's a significant portion of that 17,561. And we do have a lot of elderly folks in our state ... slowly aging and losing their abilities to care for themselves. In addition there are plenty of people in Arizona who move and fail to respond to their Registrar's overtures.

As of March 1st, 2018 here are the numbers:

Independents/others: 1,223,219 + 31,072 + 6,782 =

1,261,073 (Down 28,820)

Republicans: 1,258,994 (Down 9,754)
Democrats: 1,090,310 (Down 16,365)
Total Registered Voters 3,610,377 (Down 44,939)

The 2018 election cycle could get very interesting when you stop to consider the number of registered Democrats, Republicans and Independents and the huge voter registration decline in the fourth quarter of 2017 and the first quarter of this year. Brace yourselves, troops!

Monday, May 7, 2018 Wash It - It'll Rain!

Sources close to the National Weather Service have confirmed the old wives' tale that if you wash your car it will certainly rain within a coupla days! Now, that may seem like an outrageous claim, but actually ... it's true. It's a statement to which I can personally attest! No, really!

Just the other day (actually, Monday a week ago, I got out my canister of quarters and went to the car wash across the street from the Circle-K and got to it. First, it was soapy water on the top, then the hood and trunk, followed by the sides and the tires. That task completed, the hood was opened and I cleaned the dust out of the engine compartment. That was when the beeps started from the coin drop - so another coupla bucks-worth of quarters went in and the thing was set to rinse. The hood was shut, the bugs removed from the front-end and mirrors; then the whole thing was rinsed. A quick change to "no-spot rinse" and the time ran out just as it was completed. I write these columns four to six days before they are published - you need to know this. Today is Wednesday, May 2nd. I washed the car on Monday. It rained today, leaving water (dust) spots all over the car and streaks on the windows. That's how it works, folks!

I can attest to the fact that after I have washed the car there is every chance for a disaster. It's true!

It was mid-October 1962 in Salem, Oregon, where Claudette and I lived during my stay at KBZY, the rock radio station where I pulled the mid-day shift. I washed our car on Saturday, October 10th. It was a jaunty-looking Dodge Lancer - a fire-engine red, slant-six, four-on-the-floor, four-door coupe. (That's it and herself pictured next page...)



At any rate, Monday October 12th was Columbus day in Salem. It was raining and the wind was blowing. We take a look at Wikipedia for the details: "The Columbus Day Storm of 1962 (also known as the Big Blow, and originally as Typhoon Freda) was a Pacific Northwest windstorm that struck the West Coast of Canada and the Pacific Northwest coast of the United States on October 12, 1962. It is considered the benchmark of extratropical wind storms. The storm ranks among the most intense to strike the region since at least 1948, likely since the January 9, 1880 'Great Gale' and snowstorm. The storm is a contender for the title of most powerful extratropical cyclone recorded in the U.S. in the 20th century; with respect to wind velocity, it is unmatched by the March 1993 'Storm of the Century' and the '1991 Halloween Nor'easter' ('The Perfect Storm'). The system brought strong winds to the Pacific Northwest and southwest Canada, and was linked to 46 fatalities in the northwest and Northern California resulting from heavy rains and mudslides." That storm blew down the brick wall of a downtown Salem parking garage, killing a nearby pedestrian, and it devastated the airport, tearing private planes from their moorings and throwing them across the tarmac, trashing them like they were little toys. A wind gust of 90 mph was observed there. Again, from Wikipedia: "In less than 12

hours, more than 11 billion board feet of timber was blown down in northern California, Oregon and Washington combined; some estimates put it at 15 billion board feet"

I failed to note earlier that I had done one other thing, which I believe exacerbated the wrath of the Weather Gods. On the radio Saturday, when I gave the weather report, I sang a few seconds of the **Hopi Snake** (Rain) **Dance** song, something I had learned as a kid while visiting Hopi Tribal **Medicineman Emery Dennis** and **Chief Tewaquaptewa**, both family friends living on Third Mesa at Old Oraibi, AZ.

"The most widely publicized of Hopi rituals was the Snake Dance, held annually in late August, during which the performers dance with live snakes in their mouths. The dance is thought to have originated as a water ceremony because snakes were the traditional guardians of springs. Today, it is primarily a rain ceremony and to honor Hopi ancestors. The tribe regards snakes as their 'brothers' and rely on them to carry their prayers for rain to the gods and spirits of their ancestors." This from the Legends of America website. "Before the dance begins the participants take an emetic (probably a sedative herb) which is not an anti-venom and then dance with the snakes in their mouths. There is usually an Antelope Priest in attendance who helps with the dance, sometimes stroking the snakes with a feather or supporting their weight. The dance includes swaying, rattles, a guttural chant and circling of the plaza with snakes. After the dance the snakes are released in the four directions to carry the prayers of the dancers. Although part of the Snake Dance is performed for the tribe, this is only a portion of a lengthy ceremony, most of which is conducted privately in kivas." More at https://www.legendsofamerica.com/na-dances/3/ Ask any Hopi and the truth will out ... the Snake Dance works! It always rains within three days of its performance!

When we were very young the Thayer family used to visit Emery Dennis and The Chief every Summer. Very little might be a better word! One year - my brother Bill must have been about three at the time - old friend Medicine Man Emery asked my Dad if it would be ok to let Billy participate in the ceremony. Pop said "Sure," much to Mom's dismay, and Billy was whisked away into the kiva. He was stripped of all but his shorts, painted up with proper colors and dressed in the proper attire. Mom was beside herself, not knowing what was happening to her baby! When the dance began the dancers came out of the kiva ... each with a snake in his mouth ... including little Billy! He had a big Antelope Priest guiding him and hovering over him, using an Eagle feather to distract the snake - yes, it was a Rattler ... a big one! My dad turned to Mom and said, "Ruth ... not a peep." When the dance was done, Billy and his new buddies returned to the kiva and the snakes were taken to the four winds and let loose by four holy men who dusted the wind with yellow powder - a traditional blessing by many tribes.

Since the days of our Summer visits to Old Oriabi, the Hopi Tribe doesn't welcome the public to their Snake Dances anymore. White folks, since that time so long ago, had showed no respect for tribal customs and were forever taking photgraphs of the Hopi people. Tradition has it that if you take a picture of an Indian - not just a Hopi - you take a piece of his soul. That no longer happens because menacing Hopi teenagers, protecting tradition, see to it!

It didn't dawn on me that the Hopi song could have increased the strength of the storm in 1962.

Over two decades later, something similar happened. We had moved to Tucson AZ in 1971 with our two kids - John, 2 years and 7 months old, and Janet, 3 months. In late September and early October of 1983, five days of almost

continuous rain caused radical flooding in the area, pushing the Rillito and Santa Cruz rivers to their limits, flooding nearby Marana and destroying property in Tucson. The photo below (courtesy the **Arizona Daily Star**) shows how devastating the Rillito River flooding became. That's a house, folks - slipping away as the river eats its banks!



Between 6 ½ and 7 ½ inches of rain fell over those five days. I was working at the University of Arizona at the time and I wondered if the disaster was my fault. After all, I had washed the car before the rains came and when I heard there were going to be a few thunderstorms, I broke into the Hopi Snake Dance Song in the elevator on the way up to the third floor of the **UofA** Physics Building. Little did I know!

If you want it to rain, just wash the car. If you want a disaster, learn the Hopi Snake Dance Song and sing it while you wash the car!

"In his powerful speech to the Scouts' national meeting in Atlanta, Mr. Gates, the former secretary of defense, said that unexpectedly swift changes in society as well as swelling dissent among local Scout councils required bold action. But he also warned bluntly that the Boy Scouts' exclusionary rule left them vulnerable to painful court-ordered change ...

"Even as he acts to head off legal challenges and dissent from more liberal scouting groups, Mr. Gates must also placate the large share of troops run by church groups, some of which are strongly opposed to allowing openly gay leaders."

The Hill May 9, 2018

"The **Mormon** church will sever all ties with Boy Scouts of America at the end of next year.

"The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints released a joint statement with the scouting organization Tuesday night announcing its decision to end the 105-year relationship.

"We have jointly determined that, effective on December 31, 2019, the church will conclude its relationship as a chartered organization with all Scouting programs around the world,' the statement read.

"The decision comes a week after the scouting organization changed the name of its signature group from Boy Scouts to **Scouts USA**.

"The move to a gender-neutral name arrived on the heels of the organization's decision to accept girls into its ranks next year.

"Girls already started enrolling as Cub Scouts this year, and more than 3,000 have reportedly joined so far.

"'We wanted to land on something that evokes the past but also conveys the inclusive nature of the program going forward,' Chief Scout Executive **Mike Surbaugh** said of the name change. 'We're trying to find the right way to say we're here for both young men and young women."'

From Wikipedia:

" ... The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints was the first partner to sponsor Scouting in the United States, adopting the program in 1913 as part of its Mutual Improvement Association program for young men. ... The BSA holds a congressional charter under Title 36 of the United States Code, which means that it is one of the comparatively rare 'Title 36' corporations in the United States. ... The 1916 statute of incorporation established this institution among a small number of other patriotic and national organizations which are similarly chartered, such as the Girl Scouts of the USA, the Civil Air Patrol, the American Legion, the Red Cross, Little League Baseball, and the National Academy of Sciences. The federal incorporation was originally construed primarily as an honor; however, it does grant the chartered organization some special privileges and rights, including freedom from antitrust and monopoly

regulation and complete control over the organization's symbols and insignia ..."

Gender discrimination was charged against the Boy Scouts of America some time back for not allowing girls to join the young mens' international organization. The threat of legal action in Federal Court, charging illegal hiring practices, brought the quandary to a head.

She takes four courses of medication each day and she's also on O2 twenty-four-seven, supplied by a machine feeding a 40-foot hose attached to the cannula that goes over her ears and into her nose. She is not totally incapacitated and uses a bright blue walker to get around the house. In the car is a candy-apple-red walker with a seat and basket so she can shop if she wants. (An Oxygen bottle goes along in the basket.) There are five pills in the first course at 7:30 mornings. After that, Claudette gets up and dresses herself while I get on my drawers, a shirt for the day and socks - the shoes can wait until I to go outside.

I turn on the computer, make a cup of coffee and settle in to read the news. First, it's the email - of which I get a lot. Both the Republicans and the Democrats send tons of the stuff. So do candidates and pundits from all over the country. After culling and reading the email, which includes Fox News, RightSide Alerts, Dick Morris, the White House and the weekly Ground Game from the Boston Globe, it's off to the Drudge Report, WND and RealClearPolitics. Just so you know, I was short of material for this edition so Claudette suggested that I write about what I do when not reading or writing. She said the "girls" might appreciate it that some ol' geezer out here in the sticks might actually know how to keep house! So, there ya go ...

Thursday, May 31, 2018 Work Hard

What ever became of hard work? When did we decide that a lifetime of perpetual indebtedness to pay for a useless Liberal Arts Degree was preferable to hard physical labor that pays up to six figures to a trained, dedicated worker? Manual trades at the bottom rung today pay as much as \$50,000 to new-hires. So, where are all those folks who are still unemployed? The number of people who are not available (or willing) to do blue-collar work is stunning!

Over a week ago, **Steven Malanga** wrote in **CityJournal**, "A 2016 survey by **Pascale** found that 43 percent of students with a bachelor's degree consider themselves underemployed, as did 39 percent of master's degree students. Many students don't finish their degrees. About half of adults with only a high school diploma say that they're underemployed. Millions of prime-working-age adults have dropped out of the workforce. Even with today's low unemployment, about 15 percent of males between the ages of 25 and 52 aren't working, compared with just 5 percent in 1967."

Malanga continues, "One common explanation of the underemployment crisis is that not enough 'good' jobs are available to motivate people to return to the workforce. Yet more than a half-million jobs currently go unfilled in construction and manufacturing alone, where even younger workers can earn \$50,000 a year. Social problems have clearly played a role in firms' hiring woes. A recent study by **Princeton** economist **Alan Krueger** suggests that as much as 20 percent of the decline in male workforce participation since 1990 might be attributable to the opioid epidemic. Too many workers drop out of the labor market, addicted, while others can't pass drug tests to land jobs where worksite safety

is a major concern. 'At least 25 percent (of job applicants) fail the drug test,' the owner of a Youngstown, Ohio, tank and boiler manufacturer told **Reuters** last year."

Andy Puzder, in a May 28th FoxNews article, asserts that, "We've gone from an economy where the problem was workers being unable to find good-paying jobs to an economy where the problem is businesses being unable to find workers to fill good-paying jobs. For working- and middle-class Americans, that change is huge. It was the result of President Trump lowering taxes and shrinking the size of government through deregulation. It was not the result of higher taxes or expanded government benefit programs." SkillsUSA's Tim Lawrence echos Puzder's claim, "We should be focusing more on the millions of good jobs that do exist that we can't fill rather than the jobs we've lost."

Just yesterday, Fox Business News reported, "Employers continue to report a tough time finding qualified workers in a wide range of specialized occupations, according to the Federal Reserve survey of businesses. In its monthly Beige **Book**, the Fed said companies have faced a shortage of truck drivers, carpenters, electricians, painters and other trades. Many employers responded in the last month by raising wages and improving their overall compensation packages. Businesses in some of the Fed's 12 districts expect employment and wage gains in the coming months. The Beige Book, a collection of anecdotal reports from businesses, said employment rose at a modest to moderate rate across most districts, while the Dallas region saw solid and widespread growth. The labor market remained tight with U.S. unemployment at 3.9%, although wage increases remained modest overall."

I contend that the main reason jobs are not being filled is that America's work ethic has fallen by the wayside. Showing up

on time, not being afraid to break a sweat to get the job done, a desire to learn new ways of doing things, a willingness to work past quitting time and dedication to deliver the highest quality of work product are the qualities for which employers pay premium wages. These personal qualities are far more valuable to both employers and employees than are higher degrees that these days can force a lifetime of endebtedness and dead-end jobs.

Malanga reports that *Dirty Jobs* creator and star **Mike Rowe** has his own criteria for training, which he presents in his nononsense style. All students accepting scholarships must sign a SWEAT pledge (Skill & Work Ethic Aren't Taboo). It includes such bracing statements as "I believe there is no such thing as a bad job," "I believe that all jobs are opportunities," and "I believe that I am the product of my choices - not my circumstances. I will never blame anyone for my shortcomings." Students must promise to "deplore debt," not follow their passion but bring it with them, and "show up early, stay late, and cheerfully volunteer for every crappy task there is."

Bottom line: Want a job? Learn a trade! Out of all the people who show up for work every day, who do you suppose makes more money - the guy with grease under his fingernails or the guy standing behind the counter? The one wearing the International Orange tee shirt with reflective yellow stripes or the one wearing the white shirt and tie? The guy who goes to work clean and comes home filthy dirty and sweaty or a carwash attendant cleaning windows? The Operating Engineer driving a Caterpillar tractor or the sign-carrying paid demonstrator on the picket line?

Untrained amateurs are taking entry-level jobs that used to be reserved for teens, all the while bitterly complaining that it's impossible to raise a family while making minimum wage. It

goes without saying that there are plenty of great-paying jobs out there ... just not enough able-bodied men and women willing to train for blue-collar skills, work hard and get dirty!

We be cookin' ... that's pretty much how folks who create culinary masterpieces talk. Right? Ok, I could be mistaken because I'm not a student of all foods American or otherwise.

I haven't eaten in Boston, New York, Philly, Chicago, Kansas City, New Orleans or El Paso. But I have sampled the cuisine in Portland, Salem, San Francisco, Bakersfield, Las Vegas, Tucson and Alberquerque. All of the those famous cities are where American food is created every day from scratch. They say if you've never sampled the fare in one of these places, you just haven't lived. I obviously have a half-life left before me, which means I'll probably make a ripe 154 before I run out of good places to eat!

My brain hurts from sitting here trying to remember the first thing I ever cooked. Was it sugar cookies after school when I was a 10th-grader? Nope. Was I in the fifth grade when I cooked a hot dog on that red-handled extendable fork in the living room fireplace. No - that's not it either. How 'bout assembling a Ritz cracker, a dot of French's Mustard and a Vienna Sausage at the ripe old age of seven while traveling on vacation to visit grandma in Cottonwood? Or was it the 'Smores - squares of Hershey's Milk Chocolate melted on Graham crackers topped with melted Marshmallows - done over a campfire in the Arizona desert on the Hopi Reservation near Mishongnovi (2nd Mesa) when I was five? Hard to say ... but it was super training for one of the things I love to do!

When I was young my dad used to love to make Buffalo steaks - cooked directly on the hot mesquite coals in the fireplace. The mesquite was allowed to burn until it began breaking into little cubes and developed a light ash on it.

That's when a whole three-quarter-inch-thick piece of aged round steak was put on the fire. It had been kept in the meat-keeper in the fridge for about three weeks, until it just started to turn grey around the edges. Before it went on the fire it was dusted with garlic salt. When the edges of the steak started to turn light tan on the fire it was turned over with a pair of tongs. When that side was done the steak was recovered and the char and ash dusted off with a three-inch paint brush.

Over the years I've explored how best to cook a steak. Watching the Travel Channel and the Cooking Channel on TV has been helpful. It seems like the best steaks are cooked over searing heat for about one minute per side and then left on medium heat for another couple of minutes per side. This builds a medium-rare steak with a little bit of char on the outside. The garlic salt trick always works - learned it from an old Masonic friend who owned the Hidden Valley Inn up Sabino Canyon in Tucson. He served a 16 ounce Porterhouse, medium rare, dusted with garlic salt and had people lined up around the building to eat 'em every weekend.

All the best steaks I ever had were made from beef hung for two weeks, then aged three weeks more, dusted with garlic salt and seared a minute per side. It doesn't seem to matter whether they're cooked on or over mesquite charcoal, on a grill outside, in a frying pan or dutch oven, or on a flat-top.

To me it seems like the best are aged a total of five weeks, dusted with garlic salt, seared on both sides and then cooked two minutes per side. After that all ya need is a baked potato with gobs of butter, sour cream, chives, salt and pepper and a slice of San Francisco Sour Dough with garlic butter on it. Throw in a glass of good Dago Red and that's my idea of heaven!

Dago Red? I'm not certain, but I think the only thing close to it anymore is made by Paul Masson. Originally, it was grown by Joe Carrari on his Rancho Alamo at Los Alamos, California and bottled at the winery in San Martin south of San Jose. Carlo Rossi makes a good red wine with its Paisano brand and so does Gallo. Dago Red always goes with steak and compliments pasta with seafood such as shrimp, lobster, scallops, mussels, clams, calamari, abalone and oysters.

Monday, June 11, 2018 Amend the Constitution

Most of the states have realized similar commercial and payroll tax revenue expansions. On top of that, the GDP expanded from a predicted 2% to an unexpected 2.3% in the first quarter ... to

what the experts are predicting today - some 4.6% in the second quarter of 2018.

Meanwhile, back at Rancho Pelosi in the Nation's Capitol, the House Minority Leader clings to her 2017 claim that the bulk of the tax breaks go to the one percent while working folks get nothing but "crumbs." This is the clearest Forest-for-thetrees example I could ever conjure up! If one compares the millions in tax reductions realized by business to the hundreds in extra cash in pay envelopes across the country, one could certainly see where Pelosi would be correct in her assessment. However, without the millions in reduced business costs created by the 2017 tax reduction bill there would be nothing available to provide the payroll increases, both in the form of increased employment as well as takehome pay. Working folks appear to be appreciating Pelosi's "crumbs" because consumer confidence is way up - the highest in 17 years - and, for the most part, so are sales of just about everything! The icing on the cake is that jobs outnumber the workforce for the first time in decades and the unemployment rate has dropped to just 3.8%.

Thursday, June 28, 2018 One Korea?

NY Times April 18, 2018: "**South Korea** said it had been in talks with both **American** and **North Korean** officials about replacing the 1953 armistice with a full peace."

The Historic Armistice brought an end to the Korean conflict on July 27, 1953 by recognizing North and South Korea as separate entities on the same Peninsula and establishing a demilitarized zone between the two.

Less than two months after the April 2018 meeting, US President Donald Trump sat with North Korea's Chairman Kim Jong Un at a Summit meeting June 12th in Singapore. North and South Korean dignitaries attended both the April and June meetings.

Kim Jong Un and South Korean President Moon Jae-in expressed delight at the prospect of re-uniting the Korean Peninsula into one internationally recognized country finally at peace after some 65 years.

Here is an excerpt listing the majority of the Singapore Declaration:

"Convinced that the establishment of new U.S.—DPRK relations will contribute to the peace and prosperity of the Korean Peninsula and of the world, and recognizing that mutual confidence building can promote the denuclearization of the Korean Peninsula, President Trump and Chairman Kim Jong Un state the following:

1. The United States and the DPRK commit to establish new U.S.-DPRK relations in accordance with the

- desire of the peoples of the two countries for peace and prosperity.
- 2. The United States and the DPRK will join their efforts to build a lasting and stable peace regime on the Korean Peninsula.
- 3. Reaffirming the April 27, 2018 Panmunjom Declaration, the DPRK commits to work toward complete denuclearization of the Korean Peninsula.
- 4. The United States and the DPRK commit to recovering POW/MIA remains, including the immediate repatriation of those already identified.

"Having acknowledged that the U.S.—DPRK summit—the first in history—was an epochal event of great significance in overcoming decades of tensions and hostilities between the two countries and for the opening up of a new future, President Trump and Chairman Kim Jong Un commit to implement the stipulations in this joint statement fully and expeditiously. The United States and the DPRK commit to hold follow-on negotiations, led by the U.S. Secretary of State, Mike Pompeo, and a relevant high-level DPRK official, at the earliest possible date, to implement the outcomes of the U.S.—DPRK summit.

"President Donald J. Trump of the United States of America and Chairman Kim Jong Un of the State Affairs Commission of the Democratic People's Republic of Korea have committed to cooperate for the development of new U.S.— DPRK relations and for the promotion of peace, prosperity, and security of the Korean Peninsula and of the world."

Letting Kim Jong Un get the kudos for the positive outcome of the Summit is a plus for the North Koreans - they are seeing how the rest of the world lives as a result, and they want to join them. That both Koreas are having serious talks about re-unification is a hugely positive development. That it

will take time goes without saying. And who knows how much?

And now, it turns out the President is going to have a Summit with Russia's Vladimir Putin! What we have seen so far is just a start - like a featherbed, over-stuffed with opportunities!

Monday, July 2, 2018 Stupid Drivers

With Independence Day just around the corner, here's a little something for 4th of July drivers.

I'm not an aggravated driver. Far from it. I'm an educated, trained, experienced, once-upon-a-time professional driver. I know stuff about moving vehicles large and small through traffic most people could hardly imagine!

In the **Marine Corps** I was trained to drive everything from a Jeep to a deuce-and-a-half and a five-ton to a 25-ton pulling a flatbed with a gazillion tires on it. I've driven government-owned 12-passenger vans, high-end **Prevost** commercial tour buses and the classic 97 passenger **Crown Supercoach** school bus. In the winter of 1958 I drove an **ADOT** Dump truck equipped with a volcanic pumice spreader to make Interstate 40 in Flagstaff AZ less slippery. I've been certified to teach both classroom and behind-the-wheel school bus driver students. What's more, my early training in the Marines qualified me to repair and maintain everything from motor-scooters to tour buses.

All of the above said, I just want some time to rant about untrained drivers. Stupid (untrained) drivers are the main cause of road rage. However, anyone who would go into a rage because of the actions of another driver probably also needs some training! What are the things that cause road rage? As Elizabeth Barrett Browning wrote, "Let me count the ways."

- 1. Changing Lanes without adequate signaling
- 2. Headlamps on Bright behind other vehicles
- 3. Following too close

- 4. Changing Lanes too close ahead or behind
- 5. Slow driving in Left (HOV) Lane (10mph or less than limit)
- 6. Erratic speed or failing to keep pace with traffic7. Slow driving in Right Lane without 4-way flashers
- 8. Criminal Speeding (more than 20mph over limit or 85mph)
- 9. Weaving in and out of traffic at high speed (see also #4) Any of those turn your screws, troops?

Number One is the most common violation of the rules of the road. You've all seen the idiot who gives one blink as the lane change starts, a second blink as the wheel crosses the lane stripe followed by a third blink. Hardly any warning start or finish. Good drivers know to turn on their turn signals before starting to change lanes as a means of warning others that a lane change is coming. A good driver turns the signals off after the lane change is done. Failure to turn them off is also a road rage aggravant.

Number two is more common than you know. Bright lights behind you are just as dangerous in the daytime as at night. And if you want road rage, it's one way go get another driver to go crazy! Even though the dashboard in most vehicles displays a "bright" indicator day and night, many drivers ignore it. There are a large number of vehicles out there with headlights on when the engine is running, so paying attention - day and night - is necessary to keep you out of trouble.

Following too close is probably the cause of **the third** greatest outbreaks of road rage. The rule of thumb is don't follow any closer than one second behind per ten miles an hour of speed *plus* another second if going faster than 45mph. ie: 40mph = 4 seconds; 70mph = 8 seconds (7+1)

Perhaps nothing is more scary than #4 - a speeding car bearing down on you, changing lanes to pass mere feet away

and then veering back in front of you just three or four feet away. 'Nuf said.

In heavy traffic, especially during peak hours, driving slower than the speed limit in the far left or HOV lane makes other drivers crazy. After all, they're in a hurry to get home! They'll follow too close, blink high-beam headlights, lean on their horn, shake their fist out the window, flip you the bird, and even brandish a firearm. #5 - Best speed up and change lanes ASAP.

Number six - erratic driving will get you stopped for suspicion of drunk driving. If you get lucky and that doesn't happen, some crazy with a 9mm pistol could fly by popping rounds into your vehicle (or even you!) Try to maintain a steady speed, not impeding the flow of traffic.

There are any number of reasons to avoid slow driving in the outside lane (#7), but if you have to, at least turn on the warning blinkers (four-ways) to tell others you're going just as fast as you think is safe. Trucks, buses and moving vans make a lot of use of the right-most lane. School buses and trucks carrying hazardous materials are required to turn on their four-ways before, stop at railroad crossings, and extinguish the four-ways after getting back up to speed. Driving in the center or left lanes with the four-ways blinking is a bad idea.

The ones who cause the most problems are habitual speeders (#8). They are a danger to themselves and to others. When driving much faster than the flow of traffic, danger increases exponentially. Debris in the road, a flat tire, engine trouble and the like can turn deadly in a flash. A vehicle careening out of control will kill the people in it and anyone who happens to be in the way. Few drivers can safely negotiate a highway at speeds over 75 or 80mph. That's why more than

20 miles per hour over the speed limit (or 85mph) can be considered criminal speeding, a 30 day jailable \$500 offense. Speed limits are based on what is safe for all.

Finally, **number nine** - weaving in and out of traffic at high speed is no better than number eight. Criminal speeding is dangerous, but weaving at excessive speed is very close to suicide! One wrong move and everybody dies! Stay away from speed-weavers - give them all the room they want because they are most likely in a rage and packin' heat.

And above all ...

Keep your mind on your driving, keep your hands on the wheel, keep your shifty eyes on the road ahead. We're havin' fun, sittin' in the back seat, kissin' and a-huggin' with Fred!

An Illegal Entry Law

A little over a week-and-a-half ago, on his hit **Fox News** talk show, **Tucker Carlson** said of the Democrats, "Even enforcing our own existing laws -- ones that they voted for and passed in Congress -- is now tantamount to a hate crime."

I believe it was 1996 when the Democrat-controlled Congress passed and sent to President Bill Clinton the immigration law that is on the books to this day. The law President Donald Trump demanded that DHS, ICE and the Border Patrol enforce with zero tolerance is the very same one the Democrats touted, but with two recent changes:

- (1) Minor children must be released within 20 days of their detention part of a consent decree approved by the Ninth Circuit Federal Court in 1997 and modified in 2016 ...
- (2) Minor children will not be separated from their family members - by Executive Order from the President. Both exceptions pose their own very prickly difficulties.

What's puzzling is why the mainstream media insists on referring to the 1996 law and its humane modifications by the Courts and by Executive Orders "Trump's Law." The media is complicit in reporting - and in many instances creating - misleading information as real news.

One of the greatest examples of art/news for the purpose of outrage is TIME magazine's cover the week of July 2nd - It's a photo-shopped paste-up of little two-year-old **Yanela Sanchez** of Honduras and the President on a red background with the words *Welcome to America*.



The original photo (inset), taken by **John Moore** of **Getty Images**, shows the child and her mother **Sandra** with a Border Patrol Agent at McAllen Texas. A second photo shows the officer frisking Ms Sanchez (below), which is a customary safety precaution for Law Enforcement when



According a June 2nd New York Post article, Honduran deputy foreign minister Nelly Jerez confirmed that the mom and daughter were kept together. The Border Patrol told The Daily Wire's Ben Shapiro that the little girl was crying because she was "tired and thirsty." An Immigration and Customs Enforcement spokesman [told] the Post that Sanchez and a family member were arrested in Texas on June 12. They are currently housed at the South Texas Family Residential Center in Dilley, Texas.

The original reason for the 1996 immigration law was to deal with hoards of minor children pouring over the border from all over South and Central America. Some years later, President **George W Bush** issued the "Catch & Release" policy, an aggregation of legislation created by the Congress. In August 2006, Secretary of Homeland Security **Michael Chertoff** said that the catch-and-release practice, that for years helped many illegal immigrants stay in the United States unhindered, had ended and that DHS detained 99% of apprehended non-Mexican border-crossers - Mexican and Canadian border-crossers could be subject to expedited removal. Early in 2016 President **Barack Obama** reinstated the policy. After Trump effectively took the Obama Executive Order out of service and instituted "Zero Tolerance" for alien law-breakers, liberals went into a tizzy!

Only a few days ago the President floated a trial baloon that blew my mind! Immigrants seeking asylum who come through ports of entry will be processed in accordance with US law. Those who do not cross lawfully will be processed for immediate repatriation to their home country.

The Left's specious claims and loud public clamor, coupled with staged and photo-shopped pictures of young children, convinced the President to issue his EO barring separation of minor children from their families and assuring appropriate

housing while detained. DHS, ICE and the Border Patrol are limited on what they can do to completely institute the Trump EO because funding is limited without Congressional approval. But, that ain't all! Last week, a Federal Court Judge in San Diego ordered ICE and the Border Patrol to reunite all children and families detained at the border. The fact that there are some 12,000 of them (not 2,300 but some 12,000 scattered across the country!) doesn't seem to matter. All that's really happening - and American citizens are beginning to see through it - is the Left is desperately trying to find (or create) a Mid-term issue that will help Democrats regain the balance of power in the Congress. I stopped calling it fake news a while back. Now it's just good, old-fashioned, all-American propaganda!

I've been working on this thing for a few weeks and came up with the following:

"Any individual or family who enters the US illegally shall be detained and adjudicated within 20 days of detention. If found guilty, an individual shall be incarcerated for an appropriate amount of time, transported to their home country's Capitol and turned over to its government. Family members or other individuals, who have not been adjudicated within 20 days shall be transported to their home country's Capitol and turned over to its government. If found not guilty, an individual shall be transported to its home country's Capitol and turned over to its government.

"Nolo contendere shall be considered a valid plea.

"Individuals and/or families seeking asylum shall be detained and are required to be vetted within 20 days. If asylum is not granted or vetting not completed, detained individuals and/or families shall be transported to their home country's Capitol and turned over to its government.

"This legislation, upon being signed into law by the President, shall supersede affected parts of relevant laws, rules and regulations involving imigration into these United States of America."

One of the things that prompted this submission is the cost of detention. We can house suspected law-breakers and their children together or not - depending on the outcome of pending litigation. If we limit detention to just shy of three weeks in a humane environment we will be saving buckets of cash every day - money that could better be used to transport alien "visitors" to their home countries. Convicted felons, gang members and violent suspects can be incarcerated without bail - as a danger to society - while they await their time before a court. Those awaiting trial have been guaranteed certain rights by the courts over the years. Those simply being detained have no such rights. However, that same legal system has guaranteed minor alien children their release after 20 days. It is very clear that detention of nonfelons and their children has to be tightly controlled. Forcing that very issue will also mandate some urgency in the adjudication process. But, that will take a while.

Create a Crowd

Hysterical comments from Democrat Rep. **Maxine Waters** do no good. Waters is the one who called for the public to "create a crowd" to "push back on" **Trump** administration officials.

During the week of June 20th, conservative commentator **Rush Limbaugh** fussed about the danger being ginned up by the mainstream media. "Okay, folks, I'm just gonna say it here. If the media keeps this up - if they keep up generating this hysteria - somebody's gonna get killed."

Free speech is one thing, but inciting violence is a crime. If, as a result of a speaker's urgings, another person commits a misdemeanor, the speaker may be charged with the same crime. If urgings result in a felony committed by another, the speaker is equally liable.

Activities of folks who have responded to Waters' overtures and those from the mainstream media - at least the ones that have been reported so far - have not resulted in damages or injury. The question remains: If harassment becomes the result of inciting, is it a crime?

Thursday, July 12, 2018 Dems & Roe v. Wade

Monday, July 23, 2018

Democratic or Republic?

The United States of America is widely known as a **Democratic Republic** in which two words - *control* and *liberty* - form the basis of our country's opposing political forces.

Democratic - because the country's laws, rules and regulations are created in democratic institutions where the majority rules. A simple majority of one more than the minority is enough to make or break a proposal before federal, state, county, city and town elected government bodies. Democratic bodies seek to **control** the lives of the electorate.

Republic - because the country is considered a *public matter*, not the private concern or property of rulers. The primary positions of power within a republic are not inherited. Power is held by the people and their elected representatives, and the country elects or nominates a president rather than a monarch. The people of a Republic seek the largest degree of *liberty* consistent with common-sense law and order.

The electoral process for President described in the Twelfth Amendment to the United States Constitution (formerly Article II, Section 1, Clause 3) provides the clearest definition of the American Democratic Republic.

Selection of representatives to the Electoral College is done by the Democratic process - even if by one vote. Each state is thereby represented by a democratically elected number equal to the sum of its Senators and Representatives. None of the members of the Electoral College are legally bound to vote

for their Party's Popular Vote choice, but over the country's history it has been a custom rarely violated.

The Republic is represented in an Electoral college where each state is *equally* represented by the number of its Senators (100) and *proportionately* represented by its membership in the House of Representatives (435) plus three electors representing the District of Columbia. The Electoral College, therefore, is composed of 538 electors and requires a simple majority of 270 votes to select the President.

Both equality and proportionality make the Electoral College completely representative of our American Democratic Republic and between them comprise the most effective means of promoting liberty while preventing tyranny.

By tyranny, we allege that the majority vote represents certain death to liberty. A stark reminder of this is the story of the Homeowners Association, which by a one vote majority required one of its members to pay vastly increased fees because his home was slightly larger than the others in the HOA. The homeowner's objections fell on deaf ears and when he refused to pay the increase, the HOA sued. By one vote, a Jury found for the HOA. His Appeal failed also - by one vote. The HOA finally placed a lien on his home, again by a one vote majority. He had to sell to get out from under the debt accrued from legal fees and the lien. One vote - all the way up the ladder - was the tyrannical difference that took this guy's liberty - not to mention his home.

The popular vote in the 2016 Presidential Election constituted a majority in the most populous areas of the country (ie: along the coasts) by some 3.5 million votes. That was offset by the representatives of the states making up the majority in the Electoral College. There were enough in the Electoral College majority to prevent the tyrannical quest of electing a

candidate by a one vote majority in the coastal states. The minority garnered 227 votes, the majority 304, selecting Donald Trump and surprising election experts and pundits across the world!

A funny thing happened in New York the other day - the Democrats chose a Democratic Socialist for the 14th Congressional District seat. Community Organizer **Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez** came out of nowhere to beat tenterm incumbent Democratic Caucus Chair **Joe Crowley**. The 28-year-old girl from the Bronx won because she knew how to turn out the vote and how to motivate young people.

Ocasio-Cortez worked as an organizer for Bernie Sanders' 2016 Presidential campaign. Her 2018 campaign video began with the words, "Women like me aren't supposed to run for office." Monday, July 30, 2018

Presidential Summits

The flap over President **Donald Trump**'s Summit with Russia's **Vladimir Putin** hogged the news cycle for over a week. The mainstream media, political pundits, Democrats and Republicans alike were all on board - going so far to accuse him of treason. Complaints raged around the fact that there was no solid information relative to the contents of the private **Helsinki** one-on-one.

Senate Minority Leader **Chuck Schumer** exclaimed bitterly, "It is utterly amazing, utterly amazing, that no one knows what was said."

Catching many by surprise, Trump replied that he looked forward to a second meeting with Putin in the Fall "so that we can start implementing some of the many things discussed, including stopping terrorism, security for Israel, nuclear proliferation, cyber attacks, trade, Ukraine, Middle East peace, North Korea and more."

The fact is that private Summit meetings between the top leaders of The United States and Russia (USSR) are not at all unusual. Detailed information about the subjects discussed has rarely been made public, although many of the meetings were starting points of historic agreements..

In December of 1943 President **Franklin D Roosevelt** met in Summit at Tehran, Iran with Soviet Premier **Joseph Stalin** and UK Prime Minister **Winston Churchill**. The three met again in February of 1945 at Yalta in the USSR.

In July and August of 1945 **Harry S Truman** met with Stalin and UK Prime Ministers Churchill and Attlee at Potsdam in Germany.

In July of 1955 President **Dwight Eisenhower** met with **Nikita Krushchev** and **Nikolai Bulganin** in Geneva, Switzerland. Eisenhower and Krushchev met in September of 1959 at Washington DC and Camp David - the first visit to the United States from a Soviet leader. In May of 1960 the two met again in Paris, France.

June, 1961 saw Krushchev and President **John F Kennedy** meeting at Vienna, Austria. The Cold War between the US and USSR began in 1962 over the downing of a US Spy Plane in Russia.

There were continuing talks during the Cold War between June 1962 and October 1991. United States Presidents and Soviet leaders involved in both private and public talks included Presidents Lyndon Johnson, Richard Nixon, Gerald Ford, Jimmy Carter, Ronald Reagan and George H W Bush, as well as Soviet leaders Alexei Kosygin, Leonid Brezhnev and Mikhail Gorbachev. Meetings, Conferences and Summits ranged all over the globe from Moscow to Helsinki, Vladivostok, Vienna, New York, Washington, Valletta, Paris, London and Madrid.

The meetings of the minds over that thirty-years created the historic ABM Treaty, the first Strategic Arms Limitation Treaty, the Threshold Test Ban Treaty, the Helsinki Accords and a second Strategic Arms Limitation Treaty. There were a total of 26 US-Soviet meetings held between 1943 and 1991.

Although the talks created volumes of information, little of it became headline news until the agreements had signatures on them affixed by an assortment of official forces at play.

According to the US State Department Archive, since the breakup of the Soviet Union on December 25, 1991, Presidents Clinton or Bush met 23 times with Russian Presidents **Boris Yeltsin** or Putin. They discussed such issues as arms reductions; economic aid and reform; democracy and human rights; European security; peacekeeping in Bosnia, Kosovo, and the Middle East; and the conflict in Chechnya. In addition to meetings with Russian Presidents, President Clinton met twice in 1999 with then-Prime Minister Putin.

President **George W Bush** met President Putin in Slovenia in June 2001. The two discussed increased bilateral cooperation on economic, commercial, regional, and security issues. They met again at the G-8 Summit in Genoa and continued dialogue in the USA in November. And they had a number of conferences throughout the period up to 2006 including Putin's last visit to the White House at the invitation of President George W Bush in 2005.

Former Russian president **Dmitry Medvedev**, now prime minister, visited President **Barack Obama** in back in 2010.

USA Today shared the following on July 6th, 2017:

"Obama and Putin had a tense relationship throughout Obama's time in the White House. Their first meeting happened a few months into Obama's presidency, when Putin was once again prime minister of Russia. Obama came out of the meeting saying, 'We think there's an excellent opportunity to put U.S.-Russian relations on a much stronger footing,' according to **Politico**. Less than a year later, the two countries signed the New START nuclear arms reduction treaty.

"However, tensions climbed over the years because of a confluence of issues, from Russia banning U.S.

adoptions to Moscow granting asylum to National Security Agency contractor-turned-leaker **Edward Snowden** who revealed U.S. surveillance programs.

"A particularly notable moment between leaders of the two countries happened in 2012, when Obama was caught on a hot mic telling outgoing Russian president Dmitry Medvedev he would have more 'flexibility' to negotiate with incoming President Putin on controversial issues such as missile defense after his own presidential election. But by 2016, when Putin and Obama met at the G-20 summit, Obama said that 'gaps of trust' prevented the countries from brokering a ceasefire in the Syrian civil war."


The great difference between 2016 and today appears to be the hateful relations between the President and the opposition's leadership, political pundits and the mainstream media.

Thursday, August 2, 2018 The Cloud

Not that long ago I read that the **NSA** was uploading all of its data to "**The Cloud**." That made me very uneasy. PC Magazine wrote the following about The Cloud on May 3rd, 2016:

"What is the cloud? Where is the cloud? Are we in the cloud now? These are all questions you've probably heard or even asked yourself. The term "cloud computing" is everywhere.



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"In the simplest terms, cloud computing means storing and accessing data and programs over the Internet instead of your computer's hard drive. The cloud is just a metaphor for the Internet. It goes back to the days of flowcharts and presentations that would represent the gigantic server-farm infrastructure of the Internet as nothing but a puffy, white cumulus cloud,

accepting connections and doling out information as it floats.

"What cloud computing is not about is your hard drive. When you store data on or run programs from the hard drive, that's called *local storage* and computing. Everything you need is physically close to you, which means accessing your data is fast and easy, for that one computer, or others on the local network. Working off your hard drive is how the computer industry functioned for decades; some would argue it's still superior to cloud computing ...

"The cloud is also not about having a dedicated network attached storage (NAS) hardware or server in residence. Storing data on a home or office network does not count as utilizing the cloud. (However, some NAS will let you remotely access things over the Internet, and there's at least one brand from Western Digital named 'My Cloud,' just to keep things confusing.)

"For it to be considered 'cloud computing,' you need to access your data or your programs over the Internet, or at the very least, have that data synced with other information over the Web. In a big business, you may know all there is to know about what's on the other side of the connection; as an individual user, you may never have any idea what kind of massive data processing is happening on the other end. The end result is the same: with an online connection, *cloud computing* can be done anywhere, anytime.

"The ISPs, telcos, and media companies control your access. Putting all your faith in the cloud means you're also putting all your faith in continued, unfettered

access. You might get this level of access, but it'll cost you. And it will continue to cost more and more as companies find ways to make you pay by doing things like metering your service: the more bandwidth you use, the more it costs.

"Cloud computing—like so much about the Internet—is a little bit like the Wild West, where the rules are made up as you go, and you hope for the best."

According to RealClearPolitics:

"Within weeks of a May 2013 speech on the subject by President **Barack Obama** at Fort McNair - the National Defense University in Washington DC - an unprecedented breach" occurred at the **National Security Agency**. It was an inside job, and its scope was stunning: an avalanche of top secret documents stolen from NSA computers, and some of the material was released to the media. The culprit was a 29-year-old technology officer not even employed directly by the U.S. government. His name, as the whole world would soon know, was **Edward J. Snowden**, a computer whiz and libertarian who once described the Internet in his online chat group as 'the most important invention in all human history."

My experience over the years says that the government is the absolute worst at keeping up with the science of anything, much less computing! For many decades, government computers and IT Systems have been clunky at best. In relation to **Microsoft**, **Apple**, **Amazon**, **Google** and the like, even cutting-edge government programs pale in comparison.

While it is true that the Military, Universities and other contributors to Information Technology research have created

massive strides forward in the IT sciences, the government has never really been able to keep up.

When was the last time you visited your Department of Motor Vehicles? How about Department of Economic Security? The local Social Security office? Don't even breath a word about the VA! Why is it that America's government entities are still driving computer Model-T technology instead of the bestest, fastest, most reliable Ferraris of the IT world?

Why does the government underwrite development for military use as well as research at centers of higher education while leaving other state, federal and local government entities to wallow in outdated languages like COBOL, FORTRAN, Pascal and such? Few programmers can write system-level code anymore, preferring to use a compiler-based language such as C++ or Java.

Monday, August 6, 2018

What Happened to Lou?

Walter Isaacson took over as chairman and CEO of the CNN News Group in the Summer of 2001 after an extensive career in print, including the top slot at TIME magazine. He made it clear that he was moving CNN coverage to "opinion journalism." Lou Waters (one of the original anchors at CNN when it first aired in the summer of 1980) resented the news outlet's growing slant to the right. As I understand it, Waters wanted no part of it. To paraphrase, "I may be just a newsreader, but I will not read propaganda." Or something to that extent.

Shortly after his appointment at CNN, Isaacson attracted attention for seeking the views of Republican Party leaders on Capitol Hill regarding criticisms that CNN broadcast content that was unfair to Republicans or conservatives. Historians have noted that Isaacson's pandering behavior was endowing conservative politicians with power over CNN. Perhaps another reason Waters was good to go?

How many remember when CNN was reporting from Iraq as US Stealth Bombers delivered the goods to the outskirts of Baghdad? Remember the intrepid **Wolf Blitzer**? There he was on one of the upper floors of a Baghdad hotel describing the scene - the smart bombs going off willie-nillie and the Iraqi anti-aircraft batteries spraying the skies, trying to bring down just one of those invisible invaders. Lou Waters was there. He, too, anchored parts of the network's 24-hour-a-day coverage of the Persian Gulf War. CNN racked up all-time record audiences during its 1991 coverage.

Waters anchored seven hours of continuous coverage after the explosion of space shuttle Challenger in 1986. Lou was in the

anchor chair in 1989 when a powerful earthquake struck San Francisco and he reported live from Macedonia during NATO's air campaign against Yugoslavia in 1999. On September 11, 2001 the twin towers of the World Trade Center in New York were leveled by two commercial aircraft commandeered by radical Islamic terrorists. But Waters and his on-air partner were conspicuously absent.

According to a September 17, 2001 article in the **Tucson Citizen**, "Waters and Natalie Allen anchored 'CNN Live Today,' a weekday afternoon newscast. The program [had] disappeared ... along with much of CNN's regular programming to make way for coverage of the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks."

An old acquaintance, Lou wrote at my request earlier this year,

"I left CNN because Issacson, who admitted he knew little about broadcast news and was out of his depth, wanted to get rid of any 'original' talent. He had no idea how to compete with Fox and began bending right, not left, to do so. And in so doing ruined the brand and reputation of a News network where NEWS was the STAR.

"Ted Turner told me in his office the day I left, that Issacson wanted him home too. He said, 'I wish I'd never sold the damn thing."

Meanwhile, Wolf Blitzer kept his head down and successfully weathered the shift from opinion journalism to the left and the likes of liberal journalists such as **Jim Ocosta**. Today, Blitzer is the host of *The Situation Room*. He's been at CNN since May of 1990.

In January 2003, Issacson announced he'd be stepping down as president at CNN to become president of the **Aspen Institute**.

And Lou Waters? He's the Vice-Mayor of Oro Valley, just north of Tucson.

Thursday, August 9, 2018 JJinCO Wrote This!

Sorry, kid - but 40% of 328 million is 131.2 million, not 200 million - but hey ... 200 million is 60% of the population! Actually, the real median individual income in the US is \$31,099.

Recently Ocasio-Cortez proclaimed that Medicare for all would reduce the cost of funerals because fewer people would be dying.

Natural Power

I've been thinking about renewable energy for quite some time. And I've decided that Wind and Solar are really stupid ideas. They are not renewable ... they are intermittent at best. And what is that renewable blather anyway? How do you put the wind back in the sky? How do you put the sunshine back where it came from? Are those **Al Gore** ideas? Those questions got me going.

Note: I Googled everything but the kitchen sink to get the data together for this thing!

So, here's the deal: How about finding some real, reliable energy? Hey - they've been doing it in California, Alaska and Hawaii for decades! Mining steam! They do it to run generators and create electricity. However, I contend that production methods in practice today are way too expensive (even at \$0.01 to \$0.03 per kWh), and too inefficient - selling from \$0.03 to \$0.05 per kWh.

The whole idea about energy conversion is to utilize the most efficient method possible - something like the old water wheels ... but then there has to be a stream that runs all the time. Well, good luck with that! Hydro-electric power has been providing significant amounts of America's power for many decades, but lakes fill with silt, droughts happen and the government can't keep up. So what are we to do?

We were talking above about geothermal energy - taking advantage of the earth's crust, heated by its magma just underneath. Volcanic magma runs some 1300 to 2400 degrees F, plenty of heat to boil water and even super-heat it. But you can't just put some water down a hole and expect to

contain what comes back out! What goes in must be pure and what comes out must also be pure, devoid of all contaminants that can clog up the works in a steam-driven electric turbine.

Should be pretty simple - run the water through a stainlesssteel pipe positioned closely-enough to the actual magma that the water will become super-heated steam and return to the surface with enough pressure to drive the turbine ... without exploding, melting or otherwise degrading the pipe. The system works when there aren't any earthquakes or volcanoes around.

Earthquakes in southern California have made operating its geo-thermal projects a little iffy at times, but there are a total of 43 operating geothermal power plants in California, most north of San Francisco, with an installed capacity of 2,694 megawatts. Hawaii's geothermal field run by Puna Geothermal Ventures was ruined recently by Kilauea volcanic activity. Be that as it may, geothermal energy production has been demonstrated at the Lardarello field in Italy since 1913, at the Wairakei field in New Zealand since 1958, and at The Geysers field in northern California since 1960.

Geothermal energy takes up to a third of its gross revenues for maintenance alone. Although its \$0.05 per kWh delivered aint bad!

Whatever. Geothermal works.

Pond or tidal stream energy is another proven, yet very inefficient method of extracting power from the earth. Actually, not the earth ... the Moon! The Earth's satellite creates the tides that ebb and flow as the Moon rotates around it.

The Netherlands has created a system that uses the rush of seawater coming in and going out of one of its ports to create the power to drive bi-directional electric turbines. According to developer Tocardo Tidal Turbines, its five-turbine array is the Netherlands' largest tidal energy project and the world's largest commercial tidal installation. There are also tidal stream projects in Scotland and future plans for more in Japan. Still, this form of energy production is expensive to construct and maintain.

Saline (salt) solutions create real nightmares when it comes to equipment maintenance. It clogs up systems just the same way suspended solids do in your water system at home. Without ways and means of softening the water, things can get backed up! Whatever the maintenance costs, it still costs the customer between \$0.042 and \$0.065 per kWh.

The American Council for an Energy-Efficient Economy (ACEEE) notes that in 2008 coal cost between 7 and 14 cents per kWh; natural gas cost between 7 and 10 cents per kWh; and wind between 4 and 9 cents per kWh. In terms of new nuclear, some estimates put its price at 15 cents per kWh, or more. I don't know where ACEEE got their numbers, but they don't appear to match the ones I found. Perhaps energy costs have dropped in the last ten years because of greater generation efficiency as well as new oil and gas production, enough to make the United States a net exporter of energy.

The price of a kWh of electricity is relatively stable, but things have changed some in the last decade or so when it comes to the power bill. Nowadays, folks get an assortment of charges and fees including transmission fees, "demand" charges and meter-reader fees not to mention an assortment of local, state and federal taxes, adjustments and assessments. By the time everything gets added up, the electricity is dirt cheap compared to the add-ons. Where I live, a \$200 power

bill (for around 1000 kWh) will show about \$62 for actual electricity - only 31% of the total! That would be a very reasonable \$0.062 per kWh. But, when you stop and think about it, 69% of that \$200 bill is for something other than electricity.

An average kWh of American electrical energy today costs consumers just \$0.1028. That's the national average. Think what we could do if we produced more efficient geothermal and tidal-stream energy and got the government and corporate greed out of the picture.

Now, if we could just figure out how to harness gravity ... still workin' on that one.

■ McCain, acording to a **New York Times** report, was not doing interviews, but rather, delighted in sitting out on his deck where he once handled slabs of ribs on the grill. He and his wife listened to the hummingbirds and the burbling stream that runs through their 15-acre ranch, enjoyed the verdant scenery in an otherwise arid region and divided their loyalties when the hawks pestered Peanut, their Chihuahua mix. (Cindy McCain sided with the dog, John with the hawks.)

Navy pilot Captain John McCain spent five-and-a-half years as a prisoner of war in North Viet Nam's infamous **Hanoi Hilton** after having been shot down on October 26, 1967. He was flying his 23rd bombing mission over North Vietnam when his A-4E Skyhawk was downed by a missile over Hanoi. Part of what kept the Senator going was always his great sense of humor. He delighted in messing with friends with jokes like the one about the difference between a lawyer and a catfish. (One is a bottom-feeding scum-sucker ... the other is a fish!)

John McCain began Hospice care, sometimes called "comfort care", late last week and passed away Saturday at 4:28 pm Mountain Standard time at age 81. He died of the same disease, on the same day as Teddy Kennedy, exactly nine years later.

He was 91 and died of complications from pneumonia at a Manhattan hospital. In recent years, he suffered from Alzheimer's disease. Simon won a Pulitzer Prize in 1991 for "Lost in Yonkers."
- Leach, who would have turned 77 this Wednesday, had been hospitalized since November when he suffered a stroke in Cabo San Lucas. The famed journalist moved to Las Vegas in the late '90s and spent two decades there covering celebrity events for a number of media outfits. He was under Hospice care when he suffered a second stroke on Monday. Leach signed off each episode of his famous show with his signature catchphrase, "Champagne wishes and caviar dreams." Former Las Vegas Mayor Oscar Goodman and current Mayor Carolyn Goodman issued a joint statement Friday declaring, "We have lost a dear, dear friend and wonderful man. His kindness and decency will be missed. He was so very

charitable, and he really loved Las Vegas. An eternity of Champagne and Caviar for him."

Thursday, September 6, 2018 Is There News in Kansas?

According to my daughter, most of her news in Kansas originates out of Tulsa, Oklahoma. She claims that with a higher antenna she might be able to get Wichita. She lives in this redest of the red states. Don't bother registering as a Democrat - there aren't any! But, they say, 16 year olds have been running for office recently in Kansas! Well, maybe they make the news there, but it took a New York paper to share it nationwide.

Here's an article about it from **the Washington Post** by **Avi Selk** dated February 10:

In a state where the youth voting rate is even worse than the dismal national average, more than half a dozen Kansas teens are running for statewide office in 2018 - a sort of viral movement against apathy that could, in theory, make a high school student governor.

Naturally, adults are trying to stop it.

A state legislative committee moved a bill forward this week that would bar people under age 18 from running for statewide office, after a 16-year-old discovered a loophole in the state's electoral laws and inspired his peers to flood the race.

"Oh, I could do that," **Jack Bergeson** thought to himself when he realized Kansas law, while it restricts voting ages, says nothing about who can run for governor, the **Kansas City Star** reported last August.

So the Wichita high school junior filed to run in the Democratic primary, campaigning for health-care reform, medical marijuana and open-carry gun laws. One of his classmates, a year older than Bergeson at 17, became his running mate for lieutenant governor.

Neither of them is old enough to vote.

Some political analysts liked the idea of teens running for public office, the Star wrote, noting widespread apathy among young voters in the country. In the last nonpresidential election, census data show a mere 13 percent of Kansans ages 18 to 24 bothered to vote. The national average was just a few points higher.

[American voter turnout is still lower than most other wealthy nations]

Other adults mocked Bergeson's campaign.

"People want something different," the teen told Fox News host Jesse Watters in September. "They don't necessarily want an experienced politician."

Watters interrupted him with a sneering laugh. "Yeah, so they want an inexperienced politician, and you're going to be the most inexperienced politician ever."

"Yes," Bergeson said, straight-faced.

"Have you thought about a jacket and tie?" Watters asked, noting the candidate's polo shirt.

"If you dress more like everyday people, I think it shows a common relation between the candidates and the people who elect them," Bergeson replied.

The host cracked more jokes, but the teen was not deterred. On the contrary, he talked his friend, **Tyler Ruzich**, into joining the governor's race on the Republican side, where a huge slate of candidates was vying to replace former governor **Sam Brownback**, who stepped down to become a U.S. ambassador.

Fox News invited Ruzich to appear too - but this time respectfully, with the hosts noting his honor roll status and political experience in student government.

From there, running for governor became something of a high school trend. Four candidates, all 16 or 17, held a forum inside the Lawrence Free State high school gym in October — long before any of their adult counterparts held a debate, the **Wichita Eagle** wrote.

The forum looked not much different from any other, the newspaper reported. Teens in the audience murmured when a 17-year-old libertarian candidate got a jab in at Ruzich during a debate about toll roads. "You don't drive yet," he quipped.

In November, 17-year-old **Lucy Steyer** launched her run for secretary of state. "All of us teenagers running agreed we wanted to bring attention to all the elections," she told the **Hutchinson News**, which noted that regardless of her age, she was one of the only female candidates in the statewide races.

More and more joined the movement. By January, **NPR** wrote, six teens had entered the governor's race alone — making up about a third of the candidates.

That's when the adults began to fight back.

State Rep. **Blake Carpenter** (R) introduced a bill in the Kansas legislature in January that would bar anyone too young to vote from running for the governor's office and other top state offices.

The bill, which passed out of a committee on Tuesday, wouldn't affect the 2018 election if it becomes law. But going forward, Carpenter said, rules had to be laid down.

"If you are an adult in the eyes of government at age 18, you can serve in the military, you can do just about anything you want," the Republican legislator told the Star. "As of right now, inmates can run. I also saw reports of people saying that cats and dogs could run."

However, some in the state capitol are trying to keep teen candidacies legal. "We have all the requirements we need right now and that is, that you don't get elected unless the people decide to elect you," Democratic Rep. Vic Miller said, according to the Star.

Bergeson, the teen who started the movement, doesn't sound like he especially needs adult help.

"Allow me to clear up a misconception: I am not running for governor as a stunt, or a gag," he told the legislature in written testimony opposing the bill, according to the **Topeka Capital-Journal**.

"I am running for governor because of the minimum wage worker that has to work three jobs just to get by. I am running because our education system has been

lagging behind other states. I am running to get money out of politics," Bergeson wrote.

"But most importantly, I am running to get as many people involved in politics as possible."

Is a change in the wind, driven by youngsters who observed Millennials' foolishness?

AZ Voter Registration

Independents no longer comprise the majority of Arizona's registered voters. Since March of this year their numbers have declined by 4,611 according to the **Secretary of State's Elections Office**. But they are still a powerfull influence on Arizona politics with 34.59% of voters.

As of **March 1st**, 2018 these were Arizona's voter registration numbers:

Independents/others: 34.93% 1,223,219 + 31,072 + 6,782 =

1,261,073

Republicans: 34.87% 1,258,994 Democrats: 30.20% 1,090,310

Total March 1st Registered Voters 3,610,377

Even with the decline in Independents, Arizona's overall voter registration is up by 6%.

Here are the **August 28th**, 2018 numbers:

Independents/others: 34.59% 1,218,716 + 31,177 + 6,569 =

1,256,462 (Down 4,611)

Republicans: 34.81% 1,264,295 (Up 5,301) Democrats: 30.60% 1,111,580 (Up 21,270)

Total August 28th Registered Voters 3,632,337 (Up 21,960)

Does this mean that the Arizona Congressional Delegation is in jeopardy? ¿Quien sabe?

Republicans remain Arizona's main political party, growing by 5,301 since March. The GOP remains dominant with 34.81% of registered voters - like the Independents, a tad over a third.

The state's Democrats have successfully mounted a gargantuan voter registration drive, increasing their numbers by some 21,270 since March. Still, they comprise just shy of 31% of the electorate in Arizona. Assuming that both parties turn out decent numbers, that's not enough to win a head-to-head election with the GOP - they would need something like 152,716 to score a win.

So far, if Independents split their votes, giving an unlikely half to the Democrats, the GOP would still end up on the winning end of the stick by 150 some-odd thousand votes.

Of course, there is only one high-visibility state-wide vote for Federal office - **Jeff Flake**'s Senate seat. True to form, the polls show Democrat **Krysten Sinema** leading Republican **Martha McSally** by anywhere from 2 to 7 points and viceversa by 1 to 3 points. The **Real Clear Politics** average has it Sinema by 1.5 points. After doing the math, it seems to me that the 2018 polls are no better than those in 2016. But, that remains to be seen, doesn't it?

Arizona's Mid-term turnout during the last dozen years has been in the high 20s% to low 30s%. As I read it, Arizona Democrats are going to have to re-register another 100,000 voters, pulling mostly from the Independents, turning out more than 35% if they expect to turn the state Blue. That's one Hellofa task, troops!

After talking about it on the road and since we hadn't had any for some time, I was dispatched to the local **KFC-A&W** for a six-pac of regular drumsticks and thighs. We were both looking forward to that familiar taste of the Colonel's Finger Lickin' Good delight. Well,

apparently, since the old man isn't around to ride herd any more, they've "improved" the recipe. There was something different about it. It didn't taste like the Colonel's old familiar Kentucky Fried Chicken. It tasted like KFC - sort of abbreviated. We saved a thigh for later - cold chicken can be delicious. Later on was not how-you-call "lip-smackin' good." It was bad news. The juice that once made it great had migrated into the crust, making the once tidy morsel at once mushy and dry as a result. And it still had that odd flavor. Too bad. No more KFC for this bunch. But, to be fair, I complained to KFC and they responded positively.

Subtle changes have been creeping into fast foods. Have you noticed that almost all hamburgers use the same beef patty? It's uniformly round, fitting most buns and about 3/8 inch thick. Once it's cooked, it dries out and tastes sorta like cardboard.

Are they even shipped by air? I don't know.

It appears that customers are buying the Brand Name and not so much the products themselves. If you grew up eating a certain brand that tasted a certain way, when something changes, you notice it. Take the "New" Coke - remember that? The original sugar-sweetened Mexican-manufactured Coca Cola recipe puts the US-made high fructuse corn syrup version to shame! All it would take is a little better organization of priorities ... say the top twenty instead of top ten stories every day. No skeleton crews ... full-time, in depth writing, reporting and editing. No limit to length. Sixty seconds to twelve minutes - doesn't matter - as long as its the real deal, the truth, not made-up, not fake news. And definitely not what the mainstream is covering. I'm talking truly independent of mainstream ideals and politics.

And polls are missing the fact that the Democrats are sorely lacking for issues that can galvanize voter loyalty. The Party

hasn't identified but a few talking points. Republicans, on the other hand, have issues from all over the place - their list of taking points is Yuge!

According to an article by Alex Shephard in the New Republic last week, "'The top three issues this year are health care, health care, health care, 'J.B. Poersch, the head of the Democratic Senate Majority PAC told CNN last week. Candidates across the country, from Cindy Axne in Iowa to Claire McCaskill in Missouri to Josh Harder in California are talking about their own struggles dealing with the high cost of medical care. Tenious and time-consuming, the job also involved replacing the Xp 250G "black" HD with an older 2TB "green" HD. When I can figure out how to repair the Boot Sector of the XP Drive, it can be put back into service.

Then there was Murphy's Law ... Win 10 downloads/updates used up every penny of my 10G metered **Viasat/Excede** internet allocation and I had to buy more to speed it up. You'd

think that professional software engineers wouldn't put out a product that hadn't been debugged to the max. Instead, Microsoft puts Murphy's Law squarely in play for us consumers. That's one of the reasons I'm using a lot of '98 software. It works! I'll say this for Win 10: My computer's never booted up so fast.

Thursday's email Broadcast went out last night - better late than never - and the three-day adventure with the insides of my computer helped me finish this submission. Now, with Murphy ensconced in that dark corner over there, we can get back to the "new normal."

Monday, November 5, 2018 Happy Mid-terms!

Total Registered Voters 3,632,337 (Up 21,960)

As of **November** 1st, 2018 these are the numbers: Independents/others: 34.34% 1,276,084 (Up 19,622) Republicans: 34.67% 1,288,332 (Up 24,027) Democrats: 30.99% 1,151,745 (Up 40,165) Total Registered Voters 3,716,161 (Up 83,814)

It goes without saying that the Democrats have done a yeoman's job registering new voters. It appears to me, though, that *everybody* outnumbers Arizona Democrats. Independents by some 124,339 and Republicans by 136,587.

A good friend of mine was chiding me the other day - via email - for not bringing up the issue of the so-called pending

"brown" invasion. To quote him verbatim: "We are facing an invasion of 'BROWN' and not one word from you?" Now, that's pretty heady stuff, you've gotta admit! My man is a talented construction contractor, prominent Latino and local activist.

One report claimed that migrants were being used as shields to protect a criminal element embedded in the groups.

There is a bright spot on the horizon, actually. **TIME** Magazine reported this week that of the estimated 7,000 souls trekking through Central America, at least 4,000 have opted to remain in Mexico, going through the process of becoming immigrant citizens.

There is no black humor here. This is serious business. The "Browns" problem could easily turn out to be the most significant issue our country has faced since the Japanese forced us into the Second World War by bombing Pearl Harbor on December 7th, 1941. There's one thing we can count on for certain: We're gonna find out pretty soon.

One Great Day

It was a hundred years ago yesterday. The eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month - 11 AM on November 11, 1918 ... **Armistice Day**; the day they decided to call a halt to the **First World War**. It was supposed to be the *War To End All Wars*.

Well, they blew it ... they didn't finish the job so we had to fight World War Two only twenty years later. And then Korea. And Viet Nam and ... I'm sorry; I lost count. So many brave Americans have died in war over the years that Armistice Day was renamed Veterans Day as a way to honor all American Veterans.

Sadly, we haven't learned. History repeats itself. We still have Military Units stationed all over the world, some actively fighting in places like **Afghanistan**, others on patrol like those sailing the **South China Sea**, and still others standing guard like the men and women in **Germany**.

My dad served in the **Navy** and worked his way up to Lieutenant Commander during WWII in the Pacific. He came under fire but managed to survive. That was some crazy stuff - Japanese loony-tunes high on Sake trying to crash their airplanes into American warships. Scary. Many sailors died during the War in the Pacific. But my ol' man got lucky - he made it. I'm proud he served and thankful he survived unscathed.

I guess I got lucky, too, in a way. I joined the Marine Corps in September of 1958. The Platoon Leader's Course had me going to Arizona State College (now Northern Arizona University), committed to spend two Summers in Basic

Training at **Quantico**, Virginia and one Summer in Flight School at **Pensacola**, Florida - becoming a Marine Officer and Pilot. I would have been one of the guys flying over Viet Nam with **John McCain**.

But, I bailed. While flying jets was right up my alley, I had no use at all for Civil Engineering. I would rather drive trains. Instead, I quit college and the USMC's prestigious PLC program to become a radio broadcaster and engineer. Eventually, I became a multidisciplinary engineer rebuilding radio stations in Salinas, California, **Tucson** and **Globe**, Arizona ... and overseeing the manufacture of **Phoenix** and **TOW** missiles at **Hughes Aircraft** in Tucson.

I say I got lucky partly because I got called up during the **Cuban Missile Crisis**. We were told to be ready to catch a plane at the Portland, Oregon airport - a ride that would take a cadre of USMC Reservists to Pensacola, Florida to join our brothers in an invasion of Cuba. But, **President Kennedy** was successful at making the Russians back down, averting what could have been a nuclear war. Instead, we got the word to stand down and go home. Whew!

Later, still a Marine Corps Reservist, Hawk Missile Technician and Motorpool Management Specialist, I was passed over for duty in **Viet Nam**. Somehow, I was never called to duty except for training at **MCRD** in **San Diego**, **Twentynine Palms** and **Camp Pendleton**, CA.

The six years I spent in the Corps provided an experience every kid should have. I learned to defend and care for myself and how to become one with my Platoon, in the process becoming what the Navy calls a "Self-contained Unit." I learned how to drive, repair and maintain motor vehicles as small as the "Mule" and as large as a 25-ton Semi truck and trailer. I learned how a **Hawk** Missile works and how to aim

it so accurately it could shoot a drone out of the sky at twenty-five miles. And of course, I learned how to use and care for my M1 Garand rifle - the gas-operated, clip-fed, semi-automatic shoulder weapon used all over the world during WWII and the Korean Conflict. It remained in service until replaced by the M14, M16 and AR15.

In retrospect, I'm convinced that the Corps never called me for duty in 'Nam because of my name - John Edward "Ted" Thayer. I never came under fire and remained stateside because of **Sylvanus P. Thayer**, a distant relative from **Braintree**, Massachusetts - the man known as the "Father of West Point."

Wikipedia tells us that in 1817, President James Monroe ordered Colonel Thayer to West Point to become the superintendent of the Military Academy. Under his stewardship, the Academy became the nation's first college of engineering. While at West Point Thayer established numerous traditions and policies which are still in use at West Point. These include the values of honor and responsibility, strict mental and physical discipline, the demerit system, summer encampment, high academic standards and the requirement that cadets maintain outstanding military bearing and appearance at all times.

On May 31, 1863, the day before Thayer retired, **President Abraham Lincoln** nominated him for the honorary grade of Brevet Brigadier General, United States Army, a grade confirmed in mid-June by the **U.S. Senate**.

Although he died in Braintree, Thayer was so revered that he was interred at West Point. I'm satisfied that if it wasn't for that distant kinship with Sylvanus P. Thayer, yours truly could have easily been in line to join John McCain in the Hanoi Hilton!

Thursday, November 15, 2018 What Burns Next?

An **Investor's Business Daily** editorial November 12th reads in part as follows:

California's Gov. Brown Again Blames Fires On Global Warming - He Couldn't Be More Wrong ...

U.S. Geological Survey research scientist **Jon Keeley** has studied the origin of western fires since 1910. He says that 95% of all fires originate with humans. "This is a people problem," Keeley told **The Mercury News**. "What's changing is not the fires themselves but the fact that we have more and more people at risk."

More People, More Fire Threat

Keeley notes, for instance, that the number of homes threatened by wildfire in the Western U.S. surged from about 607,000 in 1940 to 6.7 million in 2010. That's a more than 1,000% rise. It's a basic matter of population impinging on wilderness areas.

Moreover, a 2017 study found that, since 1970 the number of fires burning 300 acres or more has actually declined. How can that be? Fires once raged across pristine forests and grasslands. But they had far fewer people or small towns in the way, as Keeley notes.

"The story can't be simply that warming is increasing the numbers of wildfires in California because the number of fires is declining. And area burned has not been increasing either," **University of Washington** climatologist **Cliff Mass** wrote last August, in response to that month's fires.

So, if not climate, what is the cause? The mismanagement of both state and federal forest lands. It's the triumph of "green" ideology over common sense.

Beginning in 1994, with the best of intentions, **President Clinton** put in place a plan to limit logging of old-growth trees to protect the endangered **Spotted Owl** in Western forests. Those moves pretty much ended what had been a policy of active management of fire threats in our national forests. Logging halted, the burnable fuel on the forest floor built up, and fires, while not more frequent, became more intense and threatening to nearby towns and homes.

"(Before 1994) mostly fuels were removed through logging, active management - which they stopped - and grazing," **Bob Zybach**, a reforestation consultant who has a Ph.D. in environmental science told the **Daily Caller Foundation** in an interview. "You take away logging, grazing and maintenance, and you get firebombs."

Mismanagement Is Nothing New

The **Western Governors Association** even warned about the mismanagement of our forest resources as far back as 2005 in a report:

"Over time the fire-prone forests that were not thinned, burn in uncharacteristically destructive wildfires, and the resulting loss of forest carbon is much greater than would occur if the forest had been thinned before fire moved through," the report warned. "In the long term, leaving forests overgrown and

prone to unnaturally destructive wildfires means there will be significantly less biomass on the ground, and more greenhouse gases in the atmosphere."

We hate to say it, but [President Donald] Trump seems to know more about the causes of the California conflagration than [Governor Jerry] Brown. What's truly a shame is that Brown is the one in denial. And his policies will lead to bigger fires and more damage to homes than ever before in the future.

The remarks above are from a November 12th Investor's Business Daily editorial. Since the Camp Fire in Northern California broke out the morning of November 8th at least 56 people, mostly elderly, have perished, 130 are missing and the entire town of Paradise has burnt to the ground. Another wildfire in Southern California, the Woolsey Fire, has killed three, and destroyed most of the high-end town of Malibu. Late yesterday the Camp Fire, 35% contained, at 135,000 acres had destroyed some 10,000 structures. The Woolsey Fire, 52% contained, had destroyed at least 504 structures and consumed over 98,000 acres.

Monday, November 19, 2018 Great To Be Alive!

I've been on this Earth since January 11, 1941. My wife Claudette got here almost four years before me on April 14th, 1937. Both of us are showing signs of advanced age. I'm nowhere close to as strong as I used to be, live with chronic back problems and lack full vision in my right eye due to a detached retina some years back. My dear lady suffers from COPD, stage four kidney disease and exhibits clear signs of dementia, the result of a fall some 45 years ago in a Tucson parking lot.

A paraphrase of the Masonic admonition of the Second Degree Staircase Lecture speaks well to our respective conditions. Over my lifetime I've been a member of **Junior Assemblies** and **Cotillion**, earned the rank of **Eagle Scout**, been a member of the Flagstaff Chapter of **Sigma Pi** ($\Sigma\Pi$) fraternity, a **DeMolay** brother as well as Chapter Advisor, a recipient of the DeMolay **Chevalier** and **Legion of Honor** and attained both the 3rd and 32nd Degrees of Masonry.

I served on the Pima County (Arizona) Republican Central Committee and was the Gila County (Arizona) Democrat Party Vice-Chairman. I was also a member of Tucson Optimist Club, serves as the Globe Rotary Club's President and sat on the Boards of the Cobre Valley Regional Medical Center and Gila Community College Foundations. Happy Eagle Day?

Anymore, there aren't many folks who know our National Emblem was almost the turkey, today's symbol of Thanksgiving. Instead, we have the majestic Bald Eagle. I can't imagine cooking and eating an Eagle, can you? With stuffing, sweet potatoes, a salad of some sort, cranberry sauce, pumpkin pie & ice cream? I guess I could handle it with a bunch of **Bailey's Irish Creme** shooters. Lotsa shooters! Instead, we got turkey!

History.com tells us that "After the Continental Congress adopted the Declaration of Independence on July 4, 1776, it next tasked **Benjamin Franklin** - along with **John Adams** and **Thomas Jefferson** - with designing a seal to represent the new country. Given the opportunity to choose a national symbol, the Founding Father never suggested a turkey.

"The story that Franklin proposed the turkey as the national symbol began to circulate in American newspapers around the time of the country's centennial and are based on a January 26, 1784, letter in which he panned the eagle and extolled the virtues of the gobbler to his daughter, Sarah. In doing so, though, he was not delivering a critique of the **Great Seal** but a new medal issued by the **Society of the Cincinnati**, an association of **Continental Army** veterans. 'For my own part I wish the bald eagle had not been chosen as the representative of our country,' he wrote. The Founding Father argued that the eagle was 'a bird of bad moral character' that 'does not get his living honestly' because it steals food from the fishing hawk and is 'too lazy to fish for himself.'

"In contrast, Franklin called the turkey 'a much more respectable bird' and 'a true original native of America.' While he considered the eagle 'a rank coward,' Franklin believed the turkey to be 'a bird of courage' that 'would not hesitate to attack a grenadier of the British Guards who should presume to invade his farm yard with a red coat on.' While the private letter was a spirited promotion of the turkey over the eagle, Franklin never made his views public, and when the chance had been given to him to officially propose a symbol for the United States eight years earlier, his idea was biblical, not avian.

"Back in 1776, Franklin proposed an image of 'Moses standing on the shore, and extending his hand over the sea, thereby causing the same to overwhelm pharaoh who is sitting in an open chariot' along with the motto 'Rebellion to Tyrants is Obedience to God.' While the committee selected the scene from the Book of Exodus for the reverse of the seal, the Continental Congress was not impressed and tabled the concept. Not until 1782 was the Great Seal of the United States, with a bald eagle as its centerpiece, approved."

I didn't know that! Did you?

Monday, November 26, 2018 Wildfire!

Back in the mid 1800s - after the **Western Territories** were acquired from **Mexico** - it wasn't uncommon to see a cowboy throwing stick matches onto the forest floor in the Fall as he and his cohort of wranglers herded their cattle out of the mountains and foothills to the flatlands of the West for the Winter. The object was to ready the forest for Winter and keep it habitable for wildlife and cattle.

Causing forest fires was a way to keep upper elevation animals and trees healthy. It was a custom practiced by **North American Natives** as far back as the 1600s. The fire burnt the drying grasses on the forest floor, trimmed the brush back and scorched the tree tunics close to the ground, keeping pests like the **Bark Beetle** in check. Singeing the forest floor also readied the fertile ground for fresh cover that would come in the Spring.

As Spring turned to Summer the cattle were herded from the lowlands back into the foothills and mountains where they would graze with any number of tiny creatures and an abundance of deer and elk. Crown fires were un-heard-of in those days because the fire never got that high. Even lightning from Summer thunderstorms didn't phase the forests because they were protected from overgrowth and brush that sustain wildfire if not held in check.

The health of the forests was also sustained by the logging industry. Clear-cutting was frowned upon because pine trees rely on fire to scorch the pine cones on the forest floor, popping them open and flinging their seeds to repopulate open areas. Conifer seeds are tough and have adapted to survive fire. Taking the old-growth trees allowed the smaller

conifers sprouting from the forest floor to compete for space in the open skies above. It's a myth propogated by overzealous environmentalists that raptors like the **Bald Eagle** and the **Spotted Owl** cannot survive properly managed Western forests. As a matter of fact, even the tiny **Southwest Willow Flycatcher** is tough as nails and makes the best of whatever its situation.

California can emulate old-time ranchers and cattlemen by reinvigorating its lumber and cattle industries and creating a new industry in the process. Clearing the underbrush that sustains forest fires, and the taking of old-growth trees encourages cleansing forest floor fires while preventing dangerous crown fires. A cooperative effort between forest managers, cattlemen and loggers can go a long way to protect the population while creating a new industry, a public-private enterprise committed to commercial forest management.

Here in **Gila County**, Arizona, we've been lucky to have two County Supervisors back-to-back that have worked with the feds and the state to implement policies, practices and procedures that thin the forests, battle the bark beetle and return logging, ranching and grazing to the high country. We have not had any major fires in the Ponderosa forests and Chaparral pastures since our government took an active interest in forest and range maintenance and management which includes controlled burns. In the process, we figured out how to make endangered Bald Eagles, Spotted Owls and the Southwestern Willow Flycatcher snug as bugs in a rug.

The **Camp** fire in northern California has claimed as many as 85 lives, 153,336 acres of land, at least 14,500 structures and the unaccounted for includes some 296 people as of this writing. A **Cal Fire** spokesman told **ABC News** the

blaze was finally 100% contained yesterday (Sunday) morning.

According to **Betsy McCaughy** writing for **RealClearPolitics**, "[California's] **Little Hoover Commission** predicts 'proactive forest management practices' can create healthier forests that will 'check the speed and intensity of wildfires.' These practices will return forests to the natural conditions of previous centuries, when forests had 40 trees per acre instead of hundreds.

"Even California's own legislature recognizes that forest mismanagement is the tragedy's major cause. The legislature passed a law two months ago to implement many of the same changes [President] Trump [is] now being mocked for proposing - controlled burning, underbrush removal and forest thinning."

Thursday, November 29, 2018

Levin, Hanson & Buckley Jr.

Mark Levin's guest the other night (Saturday - FNC) was Victor Davis Hanson, a very widely recognized historian, educator and famed conservative who was created from the same fabric as the late William F Buckley Jr.

I was impressed with Hanson's easy view of what, on the face of it, appears terribly complicated to the lay person.

On the value of a college education, Hanson noted that Colleges and Universities should be held to account for baiting and switching prospective students. Too many young people sign up for tens of thousands in tuition and fees without understanding that the major they have chosen will not result in a good job after graduation. He said the government guarantees behind many college loans allow educational institutions to raise their tuition and fees because, after all, they're guaranteed ... no matter if the kid can pay the money back or not!

He groused that students are not being properly counseled when seeking entrance to an institute of higher learning. Hanson spoke highly of trade schools. He claimed that too many young people are missing the boat when it comes to creating income. Some trades pay as much as Higher College Degrees. Plenty of high-paying jobs are going wanting, he said, because there aren't enough trained workers. Further, trade schools prepare students to enter the work force in short order - and at substantially less costs - compared to the years of increasing debt it takes to obtain a College Degree.

Mt Lemmon Cafe Chili

My daughter Janet worked at the Mount Lemmon Cafe many moons ago. That's the outfit famous for their pies! OMG! Great pies! But their Chili was also to die for!

Mt Lemmon Cafe Style Chili...

- *2-3 lbs diced beef
- *2 Tbsp oil
- *1 Lg onion, diced
- *2-3 cloves garlic, minced
- *2 (28oz) cans diced tomatoes (56oz total)
- *1 can pinto beans (28oz)
- *1 can "Ranch Style Beans" (14oz)
- *1 tiny can diced green chilies

Heat the oil in a large pot. Add diced beef and fry the meat until browned. Add onions and garlic and continue cooking, stirring occasionally, until the onions go clear, then start to turn golden brown.

Stir in the tomatoes, green chilies, pinto beans and Ranch Style Beans and bring to a boil, then turn heat to low. Stir in all spices, and simmer on low overnight, or at least until the meat is tender (At least 3 hours). The mixture can alternatively be placed into a crock pot to simmer on low for an extended period. Serve with shredded cheddar and minced onion.

Chili Spices:

2 cubes Knorr beef bullion

Salt to taste

Pepper to taste

2 Tbsp Paprika

3-4 Tbsp Chili powder

Thursday, December 6, 2018 Seven Dollars a Gallon!

After days of unrest that included widespread rioting in Paris, the French government relented Tuesday and agreed to suspend utility hikes and a controversial fuel tax, the country's prime minister announced.

Edouard Philippe made the announcement in a live televised address, backpedaling on the planned increase, which was set to be introduced in January and is now postponed until the summer.

"No tax is worth putting the nation's unity in danger," he said, just three weeks after insisting the government would not be changing course and remained determined to help wean French consumers off fossil fuels.

[The taxes were implemented as a way to get France off fossil fuels, thought by many experts to contribute to Global Warming/Cooling/Climate Change. Unfortunately, the increases were incremental and came as a massive shock to the French populace.]

[Little news of the uprising was published or broadcast in the United States until last weekend, when there were a number of deaths and scores injured in a series of violent demonstrations throughout the country.]

At least four people have been killed and more than 100 people injured after the violent large-scale protests broke out in mid-November. More than 400 people have been arrested in what officials have called the worst unrest on the streets of Paris in decades.

"The violence must end," Philippe said.

Dozens of cars were torched and shops were looted in the plush neighborhoods around the famed **Champs-Elysees** Avenue. The **Arc de Triomphe**, which only last month was visited by world leaders to mark the centenary of the end of World War I, was sprayed with graffiti and vandalized.

In his address Tuesday, Philippe also announced electricity and natural gas prices will be frozen until May 2019, a move aimed at improving spending power.

But the announcement is unlikely to put an end to the road blockades and demonstrations, with more protests possible in Paris this weekend.

"If another day of protests takes place on Saturday, it should be authorized and should take place in calm," Philippe said. "The interior minister will use all means to ensure order is respected."

On Tuesday, protesters repeatedly blocked several fuel depots and insisted their battle was only beginning.

"It's a first step, but we will not settle for a crumb," said **Benjamin Cauchy**, a protest leader.

Prominent Socialist figure **Segolene Royal**, a former candidate for president, lauded Philippe's decision but said the course correction on the climate change tax came too late.

"This decision should have been taken from the start, as soon as the conflict emerged," she said. "We felt it was going to be very, very hard because we saw the rage, the exasperation, especially from retirees. They should have withdrawn [the tax hikes] right away. The more you let a conflict fester, the more you eventually have to concede."

Right-wing leader **Marine Le Pen** lashed out at the decision as too little, tweeting it was "obviously not up to the expectations of the French people struggling with precarity."

[The price for French diesel fuel rose from 85 Euro Cents in 2000 to 1.23 Euros *per liter* by 2017. One gallon is equal to 3.785 liters. That made the 2017 average price of diesel fuel in France roughly equivalent to \$4.65 US Dollars per gallon.]

[A tax increase jacked the price of a liter of diesel to 1.48 Euros early this year, some \$5.60 USD per gallon. The November 2018 increase was to 1.52 Euros per liter or \$5.75 USD per gallon. That's a 20% increase *in one year* - almost half the increase *over the last 18 years*.]

[Most of the increases between 2000 and 2017 had to do with inflation until this year, when Global Warming taxes overwhelmed the rising cost of fossil fuels, precipitating violent demonstrations in the streets of Paris and other major French cities. There were recent reports of fuel prices as high as \$7.00 per gallon USD elsewhere.]

[Monday, **The DailyWire** reported, "The American media ... has a vested interest in maintaining audience concern over global warming, which is why **CNN** and **CBS** left out key details about France's exorbitant fuel prices. **Reuters** and other, more global news organizations fared better in their coverage, accepting that (**French President Emmanuel**) **Macron**'s efforts to curb fuel consumption may have gone a step too far."]

The Fed is Eating Your Lunch

I heard a deal the other day on the radio. These guys were talking about the Federal Reserve, better known as The Fed, the folks who supposedly set United States' monetary policy. It seems that lately they've been doing a lousy job of it. And, I'll tell you why.

The American economy depends on supply and demand to make its economic engine work properly. Lately, however, progressive ideals have been pressing economic boundaries all over the world.

Here at home, The Fed has failed to keep up with reality and begun putting the brakes on the USA's economic engine. The bad guy, according to the Fed is inflation, a concept whose time has come and gone in past decades!

Fed policy used to be to raise interest rates to contain inflation. Too much growth caused higher wages which brought along with it personal credit at unhealthy levels. The way to stop inflation was to make it too costly.

Remember the days of 6 percent add-on interest? That used to be the standard for auto loans. But, do you remember when the Fed, the States and the Courts deemed that 29.99% wasn't excessive? Not usury? Before the "Great Recession" in 2008-09 the deepest, longest-lasting recession the United States

experienced began in 1980, when Jimmy Carter was president. They called it "Stagflation."

If I remember my basic economics, if you increase the interest rate too much it forces prices up, lowering demand for goods and services, causing a recession. Following the 2008 elections and the days of the "Great Recession" the Fed lowered the funds rate (on December 16th) to one-quarter percent, the lowest in US history! They kept it there until December of 2015 when it doubled to .5%. Do you remember what happened? For almost ten years? Nothing!

Today, the unemployment rate is the lowest since 1969 - some 3.7% - and there are more jobs available than ever before, many of which are going unfilled. Wages are up and the economy is growing at a rate of some 3.5%. That scares the folks at the Fed, who over time, have forgotten the basics of American Capitalist Economics. Let me reiterate for those of you who may not have attended educational institutions that taught their students how it works.

It's called the Law of Supply and Demand. And it basically has to to with greed. The more customers want a product, the higher the price will go. If they are not so hot on a product, the price will drop to a level that consumers will accept. In other words: If you've got a hot product, you can charge a lot for it ... as much as the market will bear! On the other hand, if you have a crappy product, the market will force the price down to a point at which it will sell.

Now ... the Fed seems to have forgotten that basic maxim. There is a short supply of labor now, so wages must go up to compensate for the demand. When wages go up, people have more money to spend, creating new demands for products, forcing prices up. The Fed calls that inflation.

Nonsense! I call it Capitalism at work. It's economic growth, which is is measured by increases in the Gross Domestic Product, lately in that 3.5% range. Somehow, the Fed has equated increases in wages, product demand and prices with inflation and has increased the interest rate to a point where it is suppressing growth in the economy and scaring the dickens out of the markets.

Since early 2016, the Fed Funds Rate has increased by an outrageous 450% from .5% to 2.24%. Throw in a modicum of uncertainty about trade relations with China and it's almost like the Fed is trying to precipitate another recession.

Well, while the Fed fiddles with the cost of our money, the most valuable in the world, our country's economy appears to be headed for a massive melt-down. The Fed is slowly eating your lunch. And I have no idea what to do about it!

Funding government operations requires at least a dozen Bills approved by a majority in the **House** and a super-majority in the **Senate**.

Once again the Congress has failed to do its job and the President says he wants \$5 Billion included in the budget to fund a little over 200 miles of The Wall project along the US-Mexico border. He has said he will not sign another CR and he told Senate Minority Leader Chuck Schumer and House Majority-Leader-to-be Nancy Pelosi in a televised White House meeting last week that if he didn't get his Wall money he'd shut down the government.

Yesterday there was talk of a compromise - a CR, if you will - that would fund the government into next February, but it was being dismissed by insiders in the know. The AP reported yesterday that "The White House set the tone when press secretary Sarah Huckabee Sanders indicated that Trump doesn't want to shut down the government." Sanders said that "At the end of the day, we don't want to shut down the government we want to shut down the border from illegal immigration." Last night, by voice vote, the Senate passed a

stop-gap Bill that would fund the government but not The Wall. Next move? The House.

How can President Trump shut down the government? First, he can simply veto the Bill. Second, he could pull a pocket veto by doing nothing - which kills the Bill because its spending authorization requires the Chief Executive's signature. Either way, the Congress can only override the President's refusal with two-thirds majorities in both Chambers, a move proven successful over the years only ten percent of the time.

The battle between the Legislative and Executive branches of government may or may not be won by the deadline tomorrow night at midnight. If the Bill presented to the President is not signed by that time, all but "critical" government activities stop. However, Social Security checks, Medicare, the VA, the Postal Service, Defense and National Security are not affected by the shut-down, contrary to what detractors will trumpet all weekend. If there is a shut-down, the ones who get the short end of the stick will be some 800,000 government employees and the folks who depend on them.

Last time this happened, the Senate Leadership blinked - the "Schumer Shut-down" lasted just three-and-a-half days, January 19th through 22nd. Both Schumer and Pelosi have pledged that this time the Democrats will not budge ... or blink!

According to **Marketwatch** "The **Dow**'s biggest-ever one-day point rise came [December 26th], when it ended with a gain of 1,086.25." That means, even in a Bear Market, there is no way to go but up - optimism is in the air as we head into the new year. Savvy investors are advising keep your 401k holdings - they always go up over time.

The **Fed Funds** rate (the cost of money banks are charged) will rise by one-half of one percent in the coming year to 3.00% from the current 2.50%. The inflationary increases by The Fed between December of 2017 and December of 2018 totalled some 500% from .50 to 2.50. 2019 will see a mere 20% increase in the cost of money if the Fed keeps its pledge to raise its rate to three percent by year's end. That's good news for civilians with credit card debt. And good news for the banking community.

On the other hand, we've got every reason to feel sad about our prospects for 2019.

Congress and the **President** are unable so far to come to a compromise over continued funding of the sounthern border wall. There is a Bill ready in the **Senate** that the **House** passed by a large margin - it contains \$5.7 billion for Border construction projects. Senate Minority Leader **Chuck Schumer** has said the Democrats will not vote for the Bill,

which needs 60 votes to pass. 50 of them would come from Republicans, the remaining ten would have to come from Democrat Senators. Schumer says that "Ain't gonna happen." Meanwhile, President Trump has eased off a bit, halving his demand from \$5 to \$2.5 billion. Still no dice from the Dems. House Speaker-to-be **Nancy Pelosi** is sequestered in Hawaii and not talking.

Some 800,000 government employees will receive no pay until the government gets back to work with authorization approved by the Congress and the President. They say the **EPA** runs out of money tonight. The sticky wicket is whether President Trump will go back on his word that he would not sign another **Continuing Resolution** ... a CR that will certainly fund the entire government through February without providing funding for The Wall. There has been chatter out there that a separate Bill could be in the wind, funding some 215 miles of Border Wall/Barrier/Fencing with \$2.5 billion this **Fiscal Year** and another \$2.5 next year.

All of the uncertainty around the Government Shut-down has made it difficult for American **Blue Chip** stocks. They've had a rough December ... some say the worst since before the **Great Depression**. The Dow peaked at 26,951.81 before plunging almost 20% to 21,712.53, a loss of 5,239.28 - definitely a Bear Market, off the 4th quarter some 12.83%! Still, the economy remains strong.

What will 2019 have in store for us? Political infighting, poor service from the government until the President and the Congress agree to fund it, and an unstable Bear Stock Market. Meanwhile, Arizona's Governor **Doug Ducey** has appointed **Martha McSally** to the Senate seat being vacated by Jon Kyl, giving the state two female Senators for the first time ever! There are only three things to do ...
